TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN FOR: Director of Central Intelligence
FROM: Deputy Director for Plans
SUBJECT: Thomas Buchanan's Articles and Book
on the Assassination of President Kennedy

1. This memorandum recommends action by the DCI as contained in paragraph 2.

2. Thomas Buchanan, an American citizen for many years resident in France, was at one time a reporter for the Washington Evening Star by which newspaper he has also written for alleged Communist cause. He has been the author of a series of articles which have appeared among other places in L'Espresso in Paris which have received circulation not only in Europe but also in some places of Africa and Latin America. The articles, which contend that the assassination of President Kennedy was a rightist plot, have appealed to the thinking of many Europeans to a degree which has become of serious concern to Carl Bové of U.S.I. and to the State Department. An expanded version of the articles has now been prepared in book form and will be published at the end of this month in France by the Gallimard Publishing Company. Secker and Warburg in London are rushing an English edition which they hope to have on sale by 15 May. It is also understood that the book has been offered for publication to both Houghton-Mifflin and Alfred Knopf. Since Houghton-Mifflin is already doing two other books on Kennedy with the support of the U.S. Government and would not publish the Buchanan book immediately, it is probable that Knopf will get the rights; Curtis Brown, 576 Madison Avenue, New York City, is an erstwhile to be the literary agency involved. In addition to the Buchanan book, Gallimard in Paris will reportedly publish another book "Les Toiles Rouges de Dallas" by René Cun (believed to be a burglar), a U.S. correspondent of the Italian magazine L'espresso. Mr. Cun was allegedly in the car following the Kennedy vehicle in Dallas and his book is described as "startling". A British edition will be published by Frederick Muller of 110 Fleet Street, London.
