Mullen, 23, is accused of The secret police arrested beating to death his Filipino Huessy on Jan. 4, 1970, in an East Berlin subway station. Huessy said he was accused at his trial of making 16 statements that were slanderous to the East German regime and designed to incite resistance to it. He said he never made at least 10 of them, including one that the regime would collapse if the Soviet army moved out.
