Humphrey Sees Wider Asian Talks

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 28 The forthcoming seven-nation summit meeting on Vietnam should lead to a series of wider top-level conferences that may eventually include Asia's Communist powers, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey said today.

The touring Vice President, interviewed en route here aboard his chartered turboprop Convair, envisioned the formation of a permanent "working committee" at the mid-October meeting of chiefs of state in Manila,

That group, Humphrey predicted. would work toward convening "even broader dis-cussions of regional issues" extending beyond the Vietnam war.

As potential new partici-pants in such a subsequent Asian conference, the Vice President listed India, Japan. Pakistan, Burma, Malaysia, Singapore and Indonesia.

This session, Humphrey said, could in turn spark an all-Asian conference that would encompass Red China, North Vietnam and North Korea. But Humphrey stressed that under current conditions See HUMPHREY, A4, Col. 4
