Ike Warns Youth About Lawlessness

DENISON, Tex., Sept. 1
(AP) — Former President
Eisenhower returned to the
city of his birth today and
said he was "concerned about
disregard for moral and legal
law."

He spoke at ceremonies in which a school-community auditorium was named for him.

Gen. Eisenhower counseled hundreds of high school students in the audience to develop self reliance to prevent what he called "some faroff clique in Washington" from taking away liberties.

He advised the students to read again the Declaration of Independence, saying "I am quite sure the Supreme Court is not going to find the Declaration of Independence unconstitutional."

Gen. Eisenhower deplored what he called "the disgrace-ful riot at a great university last year," apparently speaking of the University of Call-fornia. "They said they wanted free speech but they turned it into filthy speech," he said.

He said he had detected a seeming disregard "for the moral law and the legal" law since World War I. Gen. Eisenhower visited
