• Philippines President Ferdinand Marcos met with U.S. Deputy Secretary of State Charles W. Robinson in Manila, reportedly to discuss military relations.

• The Turkish ship in search of oil, Sismik I, began taking soundings in the eastern Aegean Sea in what was described as potentially the most sensitive leg of its voyage that has caused friction with neighboring Greece.

• The Cuban Communist Party newspaper Granma accused the CIA and the opposition Jamaican Labor Party of a "wide ranging plan of destabilization" against the Jamaican government of Prime Minister Michael Manley, which has intensified contacts with Cuba.

• U.S. ambassador Walter J. Stoessel Jr. presented the Soviet Foreign Ministry with a list of 315 Soviet citizens who have been trying to emigrate to the United States and asked that speedy action be taken in the spirit of last year's Helsinki European security accord.

• Fouad Sherif, an Egyptian Cabinet minister assigned to get the sluggish bureaucracy working again, died of exhaustion due to overwork, the Egyptian Middle East News Agency reported from Cairo.

• A former premier of South Yemen, Mohammed Ali Haitham, was slightly wounded and his driver was killed in a Cairo assassination attempt the Middle East News Agency said.
