Specializing in security problems of commercial, industrial and private nature. As consultant, it is my responsibility to determine the exact nature of the problem, background and existing conditions; make analysis of the findings and note discrepancies; recommend suitable solutions and procedures.

b. August 1964 to November 1964 - Assistant Chief, Security, ~~Republican National Committee~~ *Republican National Committee*, Washington, D.C.

~~My responsibilities included the original draft of the building security plans for H.Q. Building at 1625 I Street, N.W., and a less severe security plan for the additional building at 1025 Connecticut Avenue, N.W.; the personal security of the Presidential and Vice-Presidential Candidates and the security of the aircraft, trains, boats and motor vehicles used for transportation by the Candidates during the campaign. The execution of the security program required me to travel ahead of the Presidential Candidate and arrange a secure program with the cooperation of City, County and State police. The security aspect was coordinated with the political aspect of the programs but I had authority to alter or scratch any program or part of a program which, in my judgment, endangered the Presidential Candidate. Upon arrival of the Candidate, I assumed direction of the members of the Security Staff present and together we executed close personal protection of the Candidate inside the Police lines.~~

c. February, 1964 to May, 1964 - Area Supervisor, Rockefeller for President Committee, District of Columbia, ~~1100 Connecticut Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C.~~

My duties consisted of recruiting Precinct Chairman and volunteer workers for a house-to-house canvas of my area in an effort to encourage the citizens to register Republican and vote for Rockefeller in the forthcoming Primary election in the District of Columbia. My area included Southwest Washington and the greater part of Southeast Washington; Precincts 80 through 91 inclusive. After the registration period but prior to the Primary election, my duties were changed to include a program of political education of the registered citizens which included lectures, debates, films and the distribution of political literature, oriented toward Rockefeller Republicanism.

d. March 1953 to September 1962 - Intelligence Officer with U. S. Government, Central Intelligence Agency, GS-13. As Chief of highly specialized analysts, I exercised a wide variety of talents and was responsible for the direction and administration of the section operations; determined the course of action for further research effort within the section; monitored and supervised a program of special personnel assessment; evaluated technical analyses and their relationship to specific cases; advised and consulted with members of Senior Staff components of CIA; delivered technical briefings to U. S. and foreign police and intelligence services; initiated, directed and maintained projects carried out by

private organizations such as universities, private consultants, and private research corporations; and organized and conducted extensive training programs for foreign police and intelligence services. I also initiated and developed four technical systems currently in operation on a world-wide basis within CIA and wrote articles for an intelligence periodical. In January 1962, CIA presented me with one of the largest individual Monetary Suggestion Awards ever given by that Agency.

e. December 1946 to March 1953 - Special Agent (MOS-1301) in the Army's Counter Intelligence Corps. My duties consisted of investigating crimes of security nature; member of a combat CIC team in Korea; two assignments as an instructor at the basic CIC School; enlisted Chief of the Technical Laboratory at the CIC Center, and enlisted Chief of Special Projects Technical Laboratory (CIC), Far East Command. During this period, I co-authored two textbooks for the CIC School and rewrote one other. Further I experienced over 2,000 lecture hours as an instructor in the basic CIC school and worked three and one-half years in two foreign countries. As Instructor in the Basic Course for Special Agents, I lectured and conducted practical work problems in the Observation and Description and Physical Evidence courses. Instruction in Observation and Description included giving instruction in the psychological processes involved in Observation and Description, portrait parle, use of the artist, the police lineup as an aid to identification, incident scenes and the Collection and Preservation of Physical Evidence. Physical Evidences included giving instruction in how to handle physical evidence, fingerprinting, documents, and miscellaneous evidence (glass fractures, hair, blood and body fluids, etc). I prepared and revised instructional material for courses through research of pertinent regulations SOP's and other available publications. Wrote student outlines, student texts and vault files. Prepared and conducted classes after hours for students requesting additional instruction. Conducted tests, experiments, and research with new laboratory equipment for the Technical Panel of the CIC Board. Also did operational work for local CIC Detachments and Post Provost Marshals Office.

f. April 1945 - November 1946 - Camp Superintendent, Agricultural Aide, SP-7, U. S. Forest Service, Klamath National Forest, Yreka, California. I trained personnel and directed the activities of a 100-man forest camp engaged in the eradication of timber disease (Blister Rust), and on occasion, led them as a Sector Boss on the fire line of sizeable forest fires. Camp duties also included administrative details such as payroll, food purchase and direction of safety programs.

g. May, 1941 to November, 1943 - Intelligence NCO (MOS 631) Combat Intelligence Section Chief in the grade of Sergeant. As Section Chief, I was responsible for the training of the section and the execution of any and all section assignments. Normal field duty consisted of maintaining a continuous G-2 Report and situation map of all enemy activities in the area of our command interest. It also included the briefing of Staff Officers (including the Commanding General) as requested.

h. May, 1939 to October, 1940 - Assistant Fire Guard, CU-3, McCloud Ranger District, Shasta National Forest, U. S. Forest Service, McCloud, California. I was required to maintain a Guard Station with the primary duty of forest fire prevention and suppression. This often required supervision of small crews of fire-fighters.

i. February, 1935 to June, 1939 - Laborer in the lumber and oil industries in California.

j. In addition to the brief outline above, I have considerable experience evaluating security conditions in the area of operation research, specifically, insurgent warfare. In an overseas area I was directly involved in the analysis of problems dealing with insurgent identification, overt and covert activities, police actions and psychological warfare. It was my responsibility to direct the research, analyse the findings and write the preliminary staff papers in addition to the presentation of briefings to interested VIPs and agencies.
