# LUCIUS LITTAUER, GLOVE MAKER, DIES

Ex-Congressman of New York  
Noted for Philanthropies—  
Gave Harvard \$2,250,000

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., March 2 (AP)—Lucius Nathan Littauer, glove manufacturer and former Republican Congressman from New York whose philanthropies exceeded \$6,000,000, died of a heart ailment at his country home here today. He was 85 years old.

Mr. Littauer, who was in Congress from 1897 to 1907, had suffered a heart ailment for two years, and was accustomed to taking a slow walk around his estate every morning. As he started out today he collapsed and died a few minutes later.

He leaves a brother, William, who resides at the Mayfair Hotel in Washington, D. C.

### \$2,000,000 for School

Outstanding among Mr. Littauer's donations was his gift of \$2,000,000 for the establishment of a Graduate School of Public Administration at Harvard University, his alma mater, in December, 1935, "to promote the science and art of government administration." In October, 1936, Mr. Littauer made an additional gift of \$250,000 for a building to house the Harvard-Nathan Littauer Center of Public Administration. It was opened in May, 1939.

In celebration of his seventieth birthday in 1928, Mr. Littauer announced a gift of \$1,000,000 for the cause of "better understanding among all mankind." He sent his donation in the form of securities to the Lucius N. Littauer Foundation. As a memorial to his father he built the Nathan Littauer Hospital in Gloversville, N. Y., where he was born. He also gave to his home town its community swimming pool which cost \$200,000, and the American Legion Building. He built the Jewish Community Center there at a cost of \$100,000, and in memory of his mother erected the Harriet Littauer Home for Nurses at Gloversville.

Also in memory of his father he founded, with a gift of \$135,000, the Nathan Littauer Professorship of Jewish Literature and Philosophy at Harvard. Later he gave to the university 12,000 rare Hebrew books and manuscripts. His other gifts to educational institutions included funds to be used in scientific researches on cancer and pneumonia. In 1926 he made a gift of 10,000 yearly to New York University for the study of the prevention and cure of pneumonia. His wife, the former Flora Crawford of Ridgefield, Conn., had died of pneumonia two years previously.

Since 1929 Mr. Littauer had given \$5,000 annually to maintain a foundation for advancing Judaism along literary and spiritual lines.
