E.G. Moore taken to hospital after dizziness complaint FROM The Montgomery Bureau

ROCKVILLE — Edwin G. Moore, Bethesda, who was arraigned on espionage charges Dec. 23 after FBI agents found security documents in his home, was taken to Montgomery General Hospital Tuesday night after complaining of dizziness.

A spokesman at the County Detention Center, where Moore, 56, was being held on \$150,000 surety bond, said Moore was transported to the hospital by ambulance because he has a history of heart disease.

At the hospital in Olney, a spokesman refused to divulge any information about Moore, except that he is being confined in the maximum care unit.

A former CIA employe, Moore was arrested at his home by several dozen FBI agents, who accused him of trying to sell secret information to the Soviet government. However, the FBI still has not determined if the material seized in Moore's home was the same as that contained in two typewritten notes, which accompanied the sales offer to the Soviets.

Moore was to have appeared before U.S. Magistrate F. Archie Meatyard Jr. in District Court in Bethesda at 2 p.m. today, apparently in an attempt to reduce his bond.

Moore retired from the CIA in 1973 after 22 years of service.
