Dear Mr. Klainman,

In response to your letter to Mr. Tenterdall asking that while there was a case in court I address you through him, you got a letter under date of September 18 to which you have not replied. Unless your request was a ploy to further intimidate him, the kind of response I would think the Department of Justice would least want to seem to think itself with, I still expect some kind of meaningful response. The time for appeal in that case expired yesterday hence this is no longer in court.

There are other letters, raising broader points, to which there also has been no response. I therefore respectfully request that you arrange for these inquiries to be answered in some meaningful way. Mr. Duckell's letter of September 18 responds to nothing.

It is not as if your three weeks since I filed a 35-112 form relating to withheld information from me relating to Dennis White, a recipient of two telegrams for one period in question. There has been no response, not even acknowledgment, although it may seem like weeks to November 10 to you. I suspect that non-response and long delays are not so unusual with the purport of letter of the Director of Internal Security.

All of this is, in my opinion, quite inconsistent with the political promises about law and order for political gain. Procedures should be simple. I wish you would, please.
