The basic engine is the 462-cubic inch V-8 used in Linand the Continental colns Mark III, rated at 340 horsepower. But it, too, was souped up and also tuned so that it can travel at a slow speed for parades and accelerate quickly to high speeds.

The car is probably about the same size as the modified 1961 Lincoln-21 feet long. Retractable foot stands have been built into the side for use, it is assumed, by Secret Service men.
