Alleged Mafia Boss Succumbs in Dallas

Joseph Francis Civello, 67, participant in a 1957 meeting of alleged Mafia leaders at Appalachin, N.Y., died Saturday in a Dallas Hospital.

Civello, a retired Dallas imported foods and liquor retailer, was one of 20 men who received jail fines and sentences on conspiracy and perjury charges as a result of the 1957 meeting.

The defendants in the case were publicized as ntorious Mafia leaders attending a highlevel crime conference at an Appalachia mansion.

Civello was sentenced to five

years in prison. He hired famed defense lawyer Percy Foreman of Houston to appeal his case, which was reversed in 1961.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Mary Civello; a brother, Charles E. Civello of Dallas; and five sisters, Mrs. Ross Musso of Dallas, Mrs. Margaret Polito of Baton Rouge, La., Mrs. Sam Ginestra and Mrs. Nora Zacharia of Rockford, Ill., and Mrs. Sam V. Canglosi of Baton Rouge.
