In Probe of JFK Slaying

First Arrest Made In New Orleans Official's Inquiry

NEW ORLEANS, March 1 (UPI)-A New Orleans man was arrested today in connection with "a conspiracy to assassinate President John F. Kennedy." It was the first arrest in District Attorney Jim Garrison's investigation of the 1963 Kennedy assassination. No immediate charge was filed.

The man was identified in a statement signed by the district attorney as Clay Shaw, 54, a well-known resident of New Orleans and former managing director of the International Trade Mart here.

The announcement made outside the locked doors of Garrison's office at 6:40 p.m. by a spokesman for the office. The spokesman said Shaw had been questioned since about 2 p.m.

Garrison promised "arrests . . and convictions obtained" on Feb. 18, when he first confirmed reports that he was making a new investigation of the assassination in Dallas Nov. 22, 1963.

Shaw Subpoensed

Later, he claimed to have solved the assassination and promised he would arrest everyone involved in it. Garrison maintains that he has uncovered a conspiracy over-looked by the Warren commis-

Shaw went to Garrison's office by himself after being subpoeaned by Garrison.

He was the second person so far to be summoned in the case. The first was James R. Lewallen, 38, a guality control inspector for the Boeing Co. Lewallen's attorney said
