Dear Mr. Weisberg:

On September 16 the Federal Bureau of Investigation referred to (received September 21) your January 17, 1987 and May 18, 1987 requests to them for certain records. In searching their files the Bureau located a total of five documents that originated in this agency's predecessor agency, the Federal Security Agency, or which contained information that originated in the FSA.

Of the five documents referred we were asked to review two, one classified and one unclassified, to determine whether to release or deny them and respond directly to you our determination. Those two documents are enclosed in their entirety and without deletion, six pages.

The three remaining documents are classified and we were asked to review those and return them to the Bureau, making any deletions we deemed appropriate, citing the exemptions claimed and advising if the documents still warrant classification from our prospective. We have done that and returned the three documents to the Bureau.

There is no fee for FOIA processing services charged by this agency in this instance.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

In Mr. Merch's absence I am answering your letter of the 14th regarding Dr. A. A. Brandt.

As, I believe, Mr. Price in the Bureau of Censorship has written you, Dr. Brandt submitted articles to click Pic and book but they were not accepted, and the Censorship Office is contacting the Canadian Censor regarding the article in the Toronto Star Weekly.

Our position here regarding printed material dealing with biological warfare is to discourage its publication as much as possible. As there is no legal compulsion, these efforts have been made informally principally through the O.W.I. and on the whole have been successful. We are anxious that there shall be no public discussion of this subject which may lead to fantastic speculation and hysteria. We are now considering adding biological warfare to restricted subjects in the Censorship Code and the Bureau of Censorship and the Public Relations Branch of the Army are considering whether this is advisable. This on the whole is our position.

Regarding the lecturing activities and the antecedents of Dr. Brandt, however, we are both interested and curious. We should greatly appreciate hearing anything you may find out about him and we hope, therefore, that you will not let the matter entirely
