## Cuban Exiles Plot

MIAMI (AP) - A Cuban refugee who gave up his anti-Castro activities and returned secretly to Havana says exile extremists have plotted to kill U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger.

Carlos Rivero Collado, son of a former Cuban prime minister who now lives in Miami, also said over Havana radio Sunday that Cuban exile terrorists plan open warfare against countries who vote to lift sanctions imposed against Cuba by the Organization of American States.

The scheme includes attempts on the lives of foreign ministers, ambassadors and other diplomats of nations siding with Cuba, Rivero asserted. Among those mentioned, he said, was Foreign Minister Gonzalo Facio of Costa Rica.

Rivero gave no details of the alleged plots against Kissinger and the others in the broadcast monitored in Miami, but he said the "counter revolutionaries" working against the Castro regime were to receive arms and money from the Chilean government of Gen. Augusto

Rivero is the son of Andres Rivero Aguero, elected president of Cuba in 1958 but prevented from assuming office by the Castro takeover in 1959. Rivero Aguero was prime minister and education minister under former President Fulgencio Batista.

Rivero Aguero was not feeling well and unavailable for comment, but his wife Isabel said of her son:

"I would rather he were dead than to hear that he has gone to Cuba to be with that monster," she said, meaning Castro.

She said her son had left their Miami home about five months ago after political arguments with his father. She described him as a hothead and temperamental.

Rivero Collado took part in the Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba in 1961, and his colleagues said they were shocked by his action in going over to the other side. He had worked as a newspaperman and had been active in exile causes in a minor way in recent years, they said.

Among Rivero's accusations against his Miami friends was an assertion that there was a seventh man involved in the Watergate break-in. He also said the whole story about the exiles' involvement in the scandal which toppled President Nixon had never been fully revealed.

Rivero declared that another prominent Miami refugee, Manolo Artime, had plotted two years ago to assassinate Panamian strongman Omar Torrijos. Artime was the CIA's civilian liaison chief to the invders of the Bay of Pigs.
