1) John Connally. According to the *Daily Texan* (Dec. 12, 1962) the former treasury secretary, now an important Nixon adviser, was student association president at the University of Texas in 1938. Connally as chairman of the school's judiciary council. When defeated, Dibreil succeeded from the student association and formed the "Student Party," naming himself "Der Furor" of the party, which title he used when he sent Hitler a telegram requesting his support. Connally applauded Dibreil's split and wrote him a public letter which said in part "...I humbly beseech His Excellency, Der Furor, Dibreil, to accord me the same assurance and privilege of being numbered among the Steward-Atens [sic]; and to permit me to found Daniel's sacred halls over whose door will be found Danie's immortal quotation, "All hope abandon, who enter here." Connally, leading the flock of Democrats for Nixon, is expected to bedazzle the Jewish community campaigning for its support with his strong pledge of aid for Israel and a whole new repertoire of Eichmann jokes.

2) True. According to Jack Anderson, September 24, 1971, Dr. Joseph Paucio was brought into the Republican National Committee as chief Slovak-American

adviser by Morton Dole then then appointed Dole controller of the committee's ethnic council. Paucio was editor-in-chief of *Slovak*, the official organ of Nazi-occupied Slovakia in the Forties, which became the strident voice of the Nazi regime. One of Paucio's close associates was Dr. J. M. Kirschbaum, who has been accused by the Jewish Community Council in Prague of sending Slovakian Jews to the gas chambers in Auschwitz and other murder camps. Paucio and Kirschbaum escaped fleeing by fleeing to the West. Kirschbaum got as far as Toronto; Paucio moved to Pennsylvania where he took over a weekly newspaper in Middletown. *Slovak v. America*, and named Kirschbaum as an adviser.

In June of 1971 the two organized a meeting in Toronto of their reactivated Slovak World Congress, and were hailed by Republican Senators John Tower (Texas), Strom Thurmond (S.C.), and Roman Hruska (Neb.), among others. Interestingly, the Nixon official whose job it was to keep track of subversives like ex-Nazis was Robert Mar-dian, now of the Committee to Re-elect the President. Mar-dian actually addressed the Toronto affair, saying he felt "especially akin to you and your organization. It is a common heritage that binds us together here today."

We can presume that Nixon shares Mar-dian's sentiments, as he has appointed Paucio to the advisory council of the Small Business Administration, and has invited him to at least one White House prayer service (September 12, 1971).

3) (a) On May 14, 1945 Captain John Percival, commanding the U. S. Constitution (Old Ironsides"), sailed into Danang Harbor. Upon hearing that a French missionary was imprisoned, he kidnapped five Vietnamese officials, seized three junk, and threatened to destroy the city and fort unless the King of Vietnam released the missionary. Later, Percival sent his troops ashore and killed seventeen men, women, and children, destroyed the fort, and sank many junks, causing more deaths. One week later Old Ironsides tried out its guns on an offshore island, killing and wounding over forty Vietnamese peasants.

Two years later, in 1847, then U. S. President Zachary Taylor, in a letter to the King of Vietnam, apologized for Captain Percival, saying Percival "misbehaved himself." Taylor added that if the Vietnamese didn't forgive and forget and open their doors

to trade, they would "force me to send my warships, fire ships, and soldiers to Vietnam to ask why you are so vengeful..."

4) Bayer. The company introduced heroin in 1898 as a cough-suppressant that did not "have the harmful effects of other opiates," according to the *Yale Alumni Magazine*. One year later, Bayer invented aspirin (acetylated salicylic acid) in its own Bayer laboratories and released it to the public. Heroin continued to be sold on the open market as a cure for morphine addiction until the mid-twenties. Now, of course, heroin is illegal and hasn't been seen in decades.

5) George Romney, secretary of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), a Mormon.

6) (c) Richard Nixon wrote that letter to his mother, as found in Leonard Lurie's excellent book, *The Running of Richard Nixon*. Nixon's recurrent repetition of the themes contained in this tender entreaty can be seen in his "Checkers Speech" and his unfortunately premature declaration in 1962 that the world wouldn't have him "to kick around anymore."
