It does make it look like the Congressmen is interested in the benefit he can get from Dr. Aing's murder, not in doing enything about it, doesn't it?

Of course, no Congression could have so crass a motive. Especially not a black Congressman.

But isn't it strenge that in that Congress with the greatest number of black Congressmen, when this greatest leader of the black people is assassingted and the accused assassin himself declares there was a conspiracy, no single black Congressional voice is heard?

Having come from the people who produced the Judenret, I can understand this. My own years on the Mill do not diminish my understanding.

The silence of all these black Congressmen is its own commentery. It is elequent.
