Dear Senator:

Still another letter from our Hominy, Okla., correspondent -- and an interesting one, as all of hers have been, really.

As you will note, she and her family are now actively investigating the assassination, so it seems your commission doesn't have a monopoly on that by any means, apparently. I've been thinking for quite a while that your investigation probably won't be the last; you doubtless have had the same thought. As you may recall, that investigation of the Pearl Harbor debacle that FDR initiated wasn't the last, either. Books are still being written about that great tragedy.

As you will also note, your belief that the commission's report will be the subject of worldwide discussion -- if not controversy -- is well founded. This lady is already set to find "omissions and proceed from there." Doubtless many others are, too. That's why it is so important for you to take all the time necessary and to plug up as many loopholes as possible. Your instincts on that are very correct.

I'll take the liberty in a day or so to look you up again. I know I've been a nuisance on that, but I hope you don't mind too much. Profoundly appreciate your patience and unfailing kindness and help.
