Dear Gene,

As I promised, I send you herewith the original typescript of Roger Craig's testimony. It reached me today and I expect to mail it tomorrow.

Notice that it is properly stamped and released by the National Archives as of 10/30/69, that Roger waived reading and correcting and that there is none of what he claims on it.

Let me explain this again, so you will understand. If you have any questions, let me know. If necessary, I can even produce the bills for the original court reporting. Somewhere I already have them.

The court reporter turned in more than one copy. Of the copies turned in, one became what is known as the "R" set, the one used in printing. It is on this one that corrections are made. If they are put on another set, they do not get set in type. As you will see, these were originally transcribed in Dallas then shipped to DC when typed up.

The number in the upper-righthand corner is the job number, with the Government Printing Office folio numbers added. In some cases, they shortened the typed pages, in some they lengthened them. When this was done, the original pagination is still present.

What this proves is that neither the Commission nor Roger made any changes in his testimony. You will notice that what changes are made are to make the typing conform to government style, most usually in changing spelled-out numbers into numerals.

Each of the stamps has meaning. This was set in an 8-point body type on a nine-point slug, the width of the slug being 26 picas. I am certain each of the marks was placed on the transcript at the printing office and nowhere else.

Without checking, I cannot be certain. However, I am confident that for those paranoids who will claim that there were changes made immediately, that the transcript was immediately retyped in Dallas, after the alleged changes were indicated, I have the dates on which each deposition was sent to Washington. These will come pretty close to proving that there was no time for it. I myself am without doubt, as I always have been.

The total cost is only \$6.00. I also have a duplicate set, so if there are those who may express doubts, you will be able to show that I got this for you and I can produce a duplicate. I have no other use for it, only to keep the record straight.

By the way, if you ever got the FBI reports on the other Bradley, I'd like copies.

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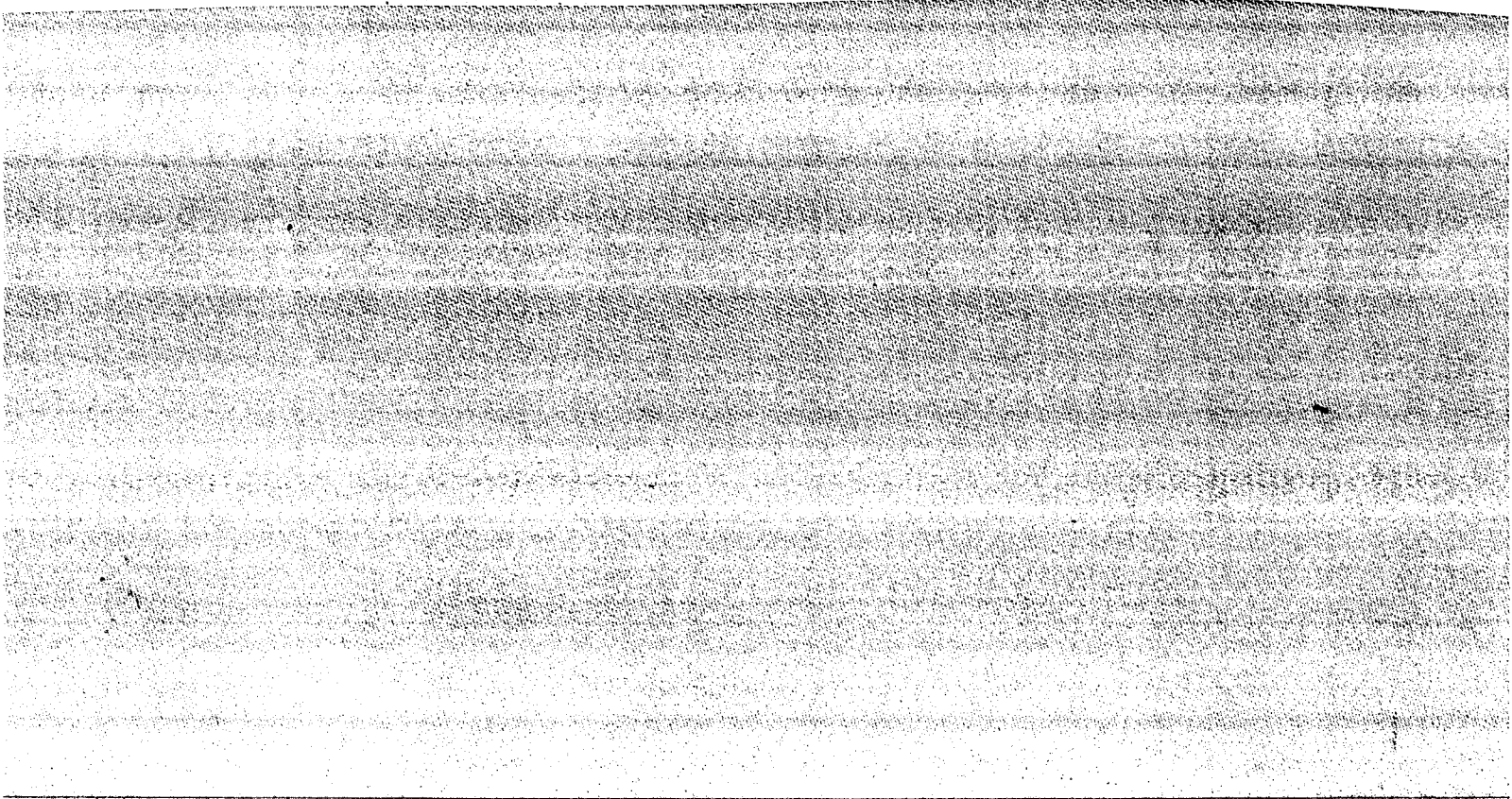

2 MR. CRAIG: No. I was born in Wisconsin,
3 raised in Minnesota; and ran away from home when I
4 was 12 and traveled all over the country.

8 on ranches up there, and then Wyoming, Nebraska,
9 Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma.

10 MR. BELIN: Well, with any relatives -- or
11 were they friends, or what?

12 MR. CRAIG: No; no; just jobs. Just working
13 here and there.

14 MR. BELIN: And then you were married when
15 you were ~~12~~?

16 MR. CRAIG: Sixteen.

17 MR. BELIN: ¹⁶Sixteen. And where?

18 MR. CRAIG: Here in Texas.

19 MR. BELIN: Here in Texas.

20 And then you enlisted in the Army when?

21 MR. CRAIG: I volunteered for the draft when
22 I was 17.

23 MR. BELIN: And then you went in the Service?

24 MR. CRAIG: Right.

25 MR. BELIN: And served overseas?

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MR. CRAIG: right.

MR. BELIN: You were discharged when, then?

MR. CRAIG: In ¹/₄ uh ¹/₇ October of 1955, I believe. In September or October of 1955, sir, is that when I got out.

MR. BELIN: Was it an honorable discharge?

MR. CRAIG: Yes.

MR. BELIN: What did you do when you were in the Service?

MR. CRAIG: I served in the ¹/₇ uh -- moto. pool of the 92nd Armored Field.

MR. BELIN: And, after you got out of Service, what did you do?

MR. CRAIG: Well, jobs were kind of hard to get. I got a job as a dishwasher in a cafe, then cook. Then I did construction work for a while. And then I went to work for the Purex Corporation out on Storey Lane here in Dallas ¹/₄ 2929 Storey Lane. Then I worked for them for about ~~three and a~~ ^{3 1/2} half years. Then, I came down to the Sheriff's Office.

MR. BELIN: Now, what would your job have been there with the Purex Corporation?

MR. CRAIG: Packager. I just packaged the Purex.

7 MR. BELIN: Are you married?

8 MR. CRAIG: Yes.

10 MR. CRAIG: Yes; I have a girl and a boy and

12 MR. BELIN: Now, Mr. Craig, I want to take
13 you back to November 22nd, 1963, and ask you whether
14 or not you were working at the Sheriff's Office that
15 day?

16 MR. CRAIG: Yes.

17 MR. BELIN: Where is the Sheriff's Office
18 located?

19 MR. CRAIG: 505 Main Street.

20 MR. BELIN: And where is 505 Main Street?
21 Is it on the north or the south side of Main?

22 MR. CRAIG: It's on the north side of Main
23 at the corner of Houston.

24 MR. BELIN: It runs from Houston east to
25 Record Street there? Is that Record Street there?

1 MR. CRAIG: No; the Sheriff's Office actually
2 runs north from Main over to Elm Street. It covers
3 that entire block.

4 MR. BELIN: How far east does it go -- or
5 is it just a half-block east?

6 MR. CRAIG: No; it's just a half block to --
7 uh -- well, it's divided, then the Records Building
8 begins and goes on to Record Street.

9 MR. BELIN: To Record Street.

10 Well, will you state what you did that day
11 from about noon on -- on November 22?

12 MR. CRAIG: I stood out in front waiting for
13 the President's motorcade. I went out there about
14 $\frac{1}{2}$ oh -- five minutes after 12:00, I guess; waited
15 directly in front of the front door on the curb.

16 MR. BELIN: That would be on the north curb
17 of Main?

18 MR. CRAIG: Right.

19 MR. BELIN: All right. Then what happened?

20 MR. CRAIG: Well, we waited there for
21 several minutes $\frac{1}{2}$ and -- uh -- the motorcade
22 finally came by.

23 MR. BELIN: About how fast was the motorcade
24 going when you saw it on Main Street?

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MR. CRAIG: Oh, just barely moving. I don't

1 know. It was just barely moving. I couldn't judge
2 any miles per hour. 730200 0 923

3 MR. BELIN: Well, five, ten, fifteen, why
4 what?

5 MR. CRAIG: Probably going -- probably three
6 or four miles an hour.

7 MR. BELIN: All right.

8 You saw the President's car?

9 MR. CRAIG: Yes.

10 MR. BELIN: You saw the motorcade reach the
11 intersection of Main and Houston?

12 MR. CRAIG: Yes.

13 MR. BELIN: And then it turned?

14 MR. CRAIG: Turned north on Houston.

15 MR. BELIN: About how fast was it going as
16 it turned north on Houston?

17 MR. CRAIG: Oh, about the same. They -- uh --
18 they were going about the same speed as they made
19 the corner.

20 MR. BELIN: Were there any motorcycle police-
21 men alongside the President's car? (Tel 0923/2 (hr))

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MR. CRAIG: Uh -- not directly beside it. They was, I believe, on the front part of it and -- uh -- I believe behind it -- just a little ways behind the back fender there was a motorcycle officer

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-- one on each side of the car, as I remember.

MR. BELIN: The ones on the front -- where would the back wheels of the motorcycles have been with relation to the front wheels of the President's car?

MR. CRAIG: Uh -- just in front of the bumper because they came by and moved everybody back, you know, as the car approached us.

MR. BELIN: And what about the motorcycles that were just behind the car? Where were the front wheels of those motorcycles with relation to the back wheels or the back bumper of the President's car?

MR. CRAIG: About equal to the back bumper.

MR. BELIN: All right.

You saw the President's car, then, turn north on Houston?

MR. CRAIG: Yes.

MR. BELIN: Then, would you describe what you saw and heard and did?

MR. CRAIG: Well, there were several other cars that came by and -- uh ²⁻ ~~m~~

MR. BELIN: Did you watch these?

MR. CRAIG: Some of them we watched. We watched Mr. Decker's car, of course, and a lot of the others.

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1 MR. BELIN: Now, where was Mr. Decker's
2 car? 730200 0 924

3 MR. CRAIG: I believe he came by just before
4 the President's. I believe there were some
5 dignitaries and things before that, and then we
6 watched the President's and -- uh -- oh, and then

8 had passed. And then we were just standing there
9 looking around, you know.

10 MR. BELIN: All right.
11 Then what happened?

12 MR. CRAIG: Then I heard an explosion.

13 MR. BELIN: When you heard the explosion,
14 what did you do?

15 MR. CRAIG: Well, the first -- nothing. I
16 wrestled with my mind. I knew it was a shot but --
17 uh -- I didn't want to believe it. But, a few
18 seconds later, I heard another explosion and, this
19 time, I knew it was a shot. And, as I began to run,
20 I heard a third one. I was running toward Houston
21 Street.

22 MR. BELIN: How many explosions did you hear
23 altogether?

24 MR. CRAIG: Three.

MR. BELIN: About how far were these noises

1 apart?

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2 / MR. CRAIG: The first one was -- uh --
3 about three seconds-- two or three seconds.

4 MR. BELIN: Two or three seconds between the
5 first and the second?

6 MR. CRAIG: Well, it was quite a pause between
7 there. It could have been a little longer.

8 MR. BELIN: And what about between the second
9 and the third?

10 MR. CRAIG: Not more than two seconds. It
11 was ¹/₂ they were real rapid.

12 MR. BELIN: All right.

13 Then what did you do?

14 MR. CRAIG: I continued running across
15 Houston Street, across the parkway, across Elm
16 Street and, by this time, the motorcade had went
17 on down Elm Street and I ran up to the railroad
18 yard and -- uh -- started to look around when the
19 people began to all travel over that way. So, I
20 began moving people back out of the railroad yard.

21 MR. BELIN: Where did the noises or shots
22 sound to you like they came from?

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MR. CRAIG: It was hard to tell because --
uh -- they had an echo, you know. There was actually
two explosions with each one. There was the -- uh --

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1 the shot and then one echo from it. So, it was hard
2 to tell.

3 MR. BELIN: Did people tell you, as you ran
4 over there, where they thought the shots came from?

5 MR. CRAIG: No. As I reached the railroad
6 yard, I talked to a girl getting in her car that
7 -- uh -- thought they came from the park area on
8 the north side of Elm Street.

9 MR. BELIN: Did she say why she thought they
10 came from there?

11 MR. CRAIG: No, she was standing there and it
12 sounded real loud at that particular point ²/_{in}

13 MR. BELIN: Uh-huh.

14 MR. CRAIG: ...and she thought that's where
15 they came from.

16 MR. BELIN: Did anyone say they had seen
17 anything -- such as a rifle?

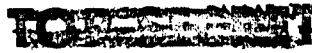

MR. BELIN: All right. Now, about how many minutes after the assassination or shooting was it that you turned this couple over to Sheriff Lemmy Lewis?

MR. CRAIG: Oh, it was about -- well, I guess, 12 minutes -- 10, 12 minutes. Something like that.

MR. BELIN: Ten or 12 minutes after the shooting?

MR. CRAIG: Right.

MR. BELIN: Then, what did you do?

MR. CRAIG: Well, I looked around for a little bit, you know, just observing the people and things, and Officer Lewis turned them over to someone else, as I recall, and sent them to the Sheriff's Office -- to Mr. Decker's office. And then it was either Lemmy Lewis or Buddy Walthers -- (spelling) W-a-l-t-h-e-r-s, one of our other Criminal Investigators, said that one of the bullets had ricocheted off the south curb of Elm Street. So, Officer Lewis and I crossed -- walked down the hill and crossed

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Elm Street to look for the place where the bullet might have hit.

4 of the bullets ricocheted off the south curb of

7 said that one of them had. So, we checked it.

MR. CRAIG: Oh, he was a white male in his twenties, five nine, five eight, something like that; about 140 to 150; had kind of medium brown sandy hair -- you know, it was like it'd been blown -- you know, he'd been in the wind or something -- it was all wild-looking; had on -- uh -- blue trousers

MR. BELIN: What shade of blue? Dark blue, medium or light?

MR. CRAIG: No; medium, probably; I'd say medium.

And, a $\frac{1}{2}$ - uh -- light tan shirt, as I remember it.

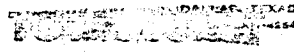
