

## TALK ON CUBAN RAID BRINGS F.B.I. INQUIRY

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—The Anti-Communist Liaison Committee said today that the Federal Bureau of Investigation was questioning participants in the organization's two-day meeting here. A private air raid on Cuba was first reported at one of the organization's meetings. Edward Hunter, committee chairman, said that at least five persons were questioned yesterday by the F. B. I.—"and the questioning is continuing today"—in an effort to build up a case proving that the Cuban raiders violated the Neutrality Act. Mr. Hunter accused Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy of "using the F. B. I. as a political machine against anti-Communist groups to try to prevent them from operating."

The dispute arose from an address before the committee Friday by Alexander I. Rorke Jr. of New York, a free-lance photographer and reporter, who

said he had participated in a bombing run over Havana last week.

BOSTON, April 29 (AP)—A student at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a pilot told The Boston Traveler in a copyrighted interview today of their part in last Thursday's bombing raid on a Cuban oil refinery near Havana.
