## Hijacked Plane Back in Mexico

HAVANA (AP) — A man who said he had a bomb in his suitcase hijacked a Mexican airliner Monday with a threat to blow it up if the pilot did not fly the plane to Cuba. Two hours later it lended in Havana, its 18 passengers and five crew members unharmed.

Mexican authorities said that soon after the plane left Merida for Mexico City, the man sent a note to the pilot announcing his intentions.

Four Americans were listed among those on board. They were identified as J. Taylor and A. Gomez of Tampa, Fla. and Mr. and Mrs. J. Culhane of Baltimore, Md.

Mexican Ambassador Miguel Covian, who called the hijacking "a totally unjustified act," said the plane was refueled at Havana and sent back to Mexico.

It landed at Havana's Jose Martin International Airport on 11:51 a.m. EST and left for the return trip less than five hours later.

The crew and all of the passengers except the hijacker returned to Mexico City with the plane.

Covian said Mexican authorities probably would seek extradition of the hijacker. He raised the same possibility after a woman hijacked a Mexican Aeromaya airliner Oct. 5 with 14 passengers on board and forced it to fly to Havana.
