Barney Rossitt, president of Grove Press, Inc., which publishes the Evergreen Review, I called the pro-Communist charge "ludicrous."
"It is unfortunate that insane

people have to resort to bombs to communicate," Rossett added.

Grenade Blasts Publishing Firm

NEW YORK (AP -- A "poweris used grenade" exploded today in the offices of the Evergiven Review of Grove Diese in Greenwich Village, today shattering three windows but causing no injuries. It was the 12th bombing incident in the metropolitan area since April 22

Moments later, a man who said he was speaking for a newly formed anti-Castro exile group telephoned The Asso-ciated Press and claimed credit for the attack as well as for two earlier bombs

Liberal Club Offices Damaged by a Bomb

NEW YORK, And 19 (UPS) at the New York office of the A bomb employed early Daily World, the Communist today in the doorway of a newspaper. West Side Manhattan biriding housing a liberal party headquarters and bomb threats were made on the U.N. Headquarters and the British U.N.

The explosion wrecked the door, heavily damaged the entrance, and shattered a win-dow of the building on upper Broadway. Two patrolmen on their regular rounds less than

50 feet away escaped injury.

The explosion was almost simultaneous with an anonymous phone call received by United Press International United Press international that a bomb had been planted at the Liberal Club by a "Cuban secret party" to protest liberal government in the United States "which we belleve is encouraging and fostering communism.

There was no damage to the Liberal Party Club on the third floor or to a Spanish club on the second floor.

United Press International also received a telephone warning from a "Mr. Losono", epresenting an alleged aid to Biafra group, that two bombs had been planted at the United Nations and one at the British Mission to protest tack of action on behalf of starving Blafrans.

Police said a search of both premises failed to turn up any bombs.

The explosion at the West Side Libera' Club was the 20th since April 22 believed linked with anti-Castro Cuban groups. The first was at the Spanish national tourist office here and the last was Aug. 6

Bomb Fla. Club Owned by Cubans

MIAMI (AP) - A bomb triggered at a fancy downtown supperclub last night showered Miami's Biscayne blvd. with concrete and glass but no one was injured.

The club, "Les Violins," a Cuban-owned restaurant that features Flamenco Cancers and strolling violimists, was closed as is usual on Mondays. The bomb exploded at about 11:30

Plate glass windows were shattered at a florist shop across the six-lane main boulevard, a two-story insurance office building and other buildings in the area. The explosion was the latest in a wave of bombings and tear-gas incidents at places owned or frequented

Militant, Exiles

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) - Sixteen militant Cuban exilo organizations closed a seven-day conference in Miami Friday at which they advocated continuous armed commando attacks by sea, air and land against Cubal to topple the Fidel Castro re-

A news release from the organization said the attacks, would be coupled with infiltration and sabotage on the island as the most favorable revolu-tionary strategy to encourage internal conspiracy and psychological conditions that would eventually bring about Castro's downfall.
