I realise it has been quite a while since I've spoken or communicated with you. But I have never forgotten you and I've always had very fond memories of our conversations together.

As my lady-friend Carol told you I am incarcerated within the Virginia Penal system. I expect to be parolled early next year, the Lord willing. That's right I said "The Lord"! I turned my life over to Jesus Christ three years ago, and Harold, I've never been happier in my life. Truly I can say my life has direction and purpose.

But enough about me. This letter is being written for an altogether different purpose. Harold, I have met a very special man here at Deerfield Correctional Center, Roland B. (Bud) Culligan. He is a Lt. General in the Air Force, who worked for the C.I.A. for 20 years and is really still employed by the agency. He is a political prisoner. The enclosures will give you an idea of what I'm speaking about. Please return all of the enclosures Harold.

Now, the crux of the matter. Before I go any further, be especially advised that it could be extremely dangerous to get too close to this situation, as people have lost their lives in so doing. Harold, General Culligan kept a daily journal of his activities for all those years working for the C.I.A. Make no mistake about it, his journal is "dynamite!" I have not read it, as it is obviously in a safe place.

Harold, remember how difficult it was to get "White-Wash" published? Gen<sup>earl</sup> Culligan desperately wants to get his journal published, but has discovered<sup>it is</sup> practically impossible to do so as nobody will touch it.



I know you will not under-estimate the significance of General Culligan's journal. Truly, he is quite a man. I know you will like him alot if, and when you meet him, or just correspond with him.

God bless you Harold, and your lovely wife. I look forward eagerly to your response.
