Dear Fir. Murphy,

As not infrequently happens when we accumulate the years, 79 for me now, we also accumulate stacks of records in the expectation of further interest in them or in anticipation of responses.

I've had no response from you to my 6/15/95 letter relating to the records of the broadcasts of the Dallas police. As I then told you, all that information was within my mitigated C.A. 78-0322, for all the JFK assassination records of the FBI's Dallas field office. It not only is within the litigated request, it was the subject of filings of both parties. The FBI claimed it did not have any of them, I provided the FBI documents reflecting that it did and where they were and who made what copies when and on what tape recorder and the FBI merely ignored it.

Under date of 5/15/90 Nr. Huff wrote Jim Lesar, who had represented me in the litie gation and who then had another client, that the Department had found the recordings exactly where gI had informed it they were. He makes specific reference to what the Department incorrectly told the Court it did not have, these recordings.

That information is without question within my litigated request and without question the government was under the obligation to provide me with copies without cost.

I hope that the archives will not willingly permit itself to be used to frustrate the law and the government's obligations under it and - hope that you now be kind enough to provide me with the sopies that should have been given to me more than adecade ago. I would very much appreciate that.

Dar ir. wurphy,

Thank you very much for your letter of the 8th and the explanations and offers in it. I write in response in some detail for your information and to make a record for history, if for nothing else.

It is physically impossible for me to go to the archives and examine or listen to anything at all. I have not been able to drive out of Frederick since 1977, travel is in any event quite tiring for me, and I can't stand still at all or walk very far.

Mr. Huff wrote me after he made the transfers you report. I have no reason at all to believe he provided you or the archives with any of the background. His letter to me includes his date on the appeal. Your copy should have this. So, you can see in your own records that he just transferred to the archives what was mine as a matter of law a decade ago in his accounting. And his accounting simply is not honest. Perhaps none of you noticed this and then wondereds what in response to a ppeal of a decade ago instead of complying, because what was transferred is not within any FOIA exemption, he put it in the archives. I suggest it is time for the archives to wonder about this. And about when a similar trick was pulled in the past, as it was at least once.

In 1978 I filed suit for the JFK assassination records of the Dallas FBI field office. It was C.a.78 0322 in federal district court in Washington. The recordings of the Dallas police radio were within that request. To deny me access the FBI uttered a series of knowingly false recordings, all sworn to. It claimed, among other things, that it never had those recordings. This was obviously false because as your own files and the published Warren Commission exhibits include the transcription of those broadcasts made by the FBI for the Commission.

In that litigation - and this presents an addition problem for both of us - I was to have been given copies of everything without charge. I had a complete fee waiver. And as Mr. Huff and his staff know very well, that fee waiver now does not have to apply to the archives.

The inventory you were kind enough to include identifies some of the recordings as on 7" reel - acetate. It does not indicate who did the dubbing and when it was done.

Item 60 JFK.05 notes what is of most interest to me in those recordings, the period of time channel I was block for six minutes. (Item 007416) When you can provide it I would like a dub of this and of the belt for the same period and I will pay for both and not raise the problems I indicate above. However, - do want the archives to know that I was entitled to all the recordings in that litigation and the FBI lied and the

appeals office stonewalled. I am certain the Archives was not told any of this and I am not alleging that any of you combined with anyone in this dirtyworks.

For your information, the Moorman picture in this invenotry was also within the lawsuit and about it the FBI also lied and did not provide a copy.

I do not know how clear his recollection is but I think Jim resar will have a clear ecollection of the recorings in that litigation and may recall the Hoorman and other pictures.

I am sorry that I cannot offer to dearch my copies of the relevant records in that lawsuit should you want them, but they are available to anyone. Doing this is now beyond my capabilities.

I refer to what the Department of Justice has done as dirtyworks and said it was not the only such misuse of the archives. Earlier something similar was done at the insfigation of the Department when the Secret Service and - reached an agreement under which f gave it my word I would not file a FOIA action to obtain its JFK assassination information that interested me. The Secret Service agreeded for me to have access and then, as directed by the "epartment, transferred those materials to the archives which, again under instructions, did not provide copies.


Meither you nor I nor the archives can do anything about the past. But - think that what I report is not traditional scholarship or archival practise.

as you probably know, there is considerable controversy about the police recordings. I do regret that to the many other and lamentable repressive actions of the past we now have this new taint.

after I have a chance to think about this further and to consult with others I may write you further about it. But I do not intend to pay for copies of what was mine as a matter of law more than a decade ago and was denied me first by felonies and then by official nalfeasances and misfeasances.

I do, very much, regret that this has happeend again. I think you can understand why I refer to making a record for history. I assure you there is nothing personal in it.

Dear Mr. Weisberg:

By referral, Mr. Richard L. Huff, Co-Director, Office of Information and Privacy, Department of Justice, has informed us of your long-standing request, pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act, for access to the "open-mike" sound recordings from the Dallas Police Department. As you know, the Department of Justice recently transferred the recordings and related documentation to our custody. An inventory is enclosed for your information.

The seven Gray Audiograph disks are still playable, the National Archives has proper playing equipment, and our laboratory plans to copy them on to archival master recording tape and cassette reference copies within the next thirty days. The same holds true for the four 1/4" open-reel recordings.

Access to the dictabelts will take longer because of their poor condition. They appear to have been stored flat for a long time and as a result have developed folds or creases. In addition, belt number 10, of most interest to you, has developed cracked edges and has been repaired with scotch tape. Our laboratory plans to rehumidify the belts to help restore their original flexibility and will then rerecord them. Our lab also has the equipment to play the belts though some modifications will be necessary. We estimate this work will take about ninety days to complete.

In recognition of your record of scholarship in this area, we will be pleased to play the Audiograph disks for you in our laboratory after the preservation work has been completed. However, this will not be possible with the belts because of the stop and go nature of making the recordings play. Thus, we hope an accurate and faithful copy will accommodate you.

After the recordings have been rerecorded you will be able to purchase your own copies at \$.95 per minute for open reel or .65 for cassette. Alternatively, you can study them in our research room and make your own copies free of charge.

It may also be of interest to note that the records of the House of Representatives Select Committee on Assassinations (Reord Group 233) in our custody contain sound recordings of the Dallas Police Department, Channel 2, and an analysis and interpretation. Please see the enclosed list. These recordings are available for study only with the written permission of the Clerk of the House.

We hope this information is helfpful, and look forward to providing you with the historical materials needed to carry out your research.



This is in further response to my letter to you dated December 31, 1984, in which I advised you that as a result of a lead uncovered during the processing of records responsive to a request made by Harold Weisberg, a small number of records pertaining to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy had been located in the office safe of Roger Cubbage, a Criminal Division attorney. These records include the original dictabelt provided to the House Select Committee on Assassinations by the Dallas Police Office. We had determined that these records appeared to be responsive to the request of your client, Mark Allen.

Please be advised that because of their historical importance, all of the records pertaining to the assassination which were located in Mr. Cubbage's safe have been given to the National Archives and Records Administration. This includes the original Dallas police dictabelt.
