It is always a disappointment to me to find even those who oppress us with so little self-respect, so little concern for fact and truth, or such contempt for the obligations of the writer and the national interest and integrity.

How can we live with so much of this in those allegedly mature and not be at least sympathetic to the perplexities of youth and their inability to cope with them or, really, to have any influence on their own destinies?
