## Kennedy: Wisconsin residents turn sleuths

**SHEBOYGAN (AP)** — A Sheboygan man has made a film about John F. Kennedy's assassination which, like film maker Oliver Stone's "JFK," challenges official findings about the shooting.

Unlike Stone, Dennis Darovich will never make a dime on his film.

His film can be seen for free almost any night at his home. Darovich says it blows away the Warren Commission's findings that Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone when he fired the shot that killed Kennedy in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963.

Darovich, 36, was 7 years old at the time of the assassination. He says from that moment, he's been a student of the Kennedy assassination, convinced that the truth about the death has been deliberately obscured.

"Why is the government covering up? Why won't it release the assassination files. What is it hiding?" he said.

Darovich has found other freelance researchers looking for the

truth. "To us, it's an unsolved crime," he said.

Locally, Darovich, a Heritage Insurance Co. underwriting supervisor, is joined in his research effort by his neighbor Chris Larson, a Heritage commercial underwriter, and by Jack Meier, who has traveled to Washington and the Library of Congress searching for pieces to the assassination puzzle.

Next will be a trip to Dallas for a look at the motorcade route, Dealy Plaza and the Texas School Book Depository building, where Oswald was supposed to have fired the fatal shot.

Darovich and Larson said they're convinced the assassination was part of a conspiracy involving elements of the Mafia, the CIA, the FBI, possibly the Secret Service, Army and Navy intelligence, and others.

Alone and together, they have scrutinized films, photographs, autopsy reports and all documents available to them.
