Ricardo Davis Clay Shaw Attorney General Wlark's statements

Moo, please read this then give it to Alcock, who should by now have read the transcript of the Davis phone interviews I had the very cold, snowy night of January 23 -24, this past winter.

With everything else I have ment in the past having such a high disappearance rate in your office, I attack a photocopy of the letter I wrote Jim after I awakened and after I spoke to Alcock.

I have marked a few special items in the margin, in red. Note that he says be knew Oswald, had seen his colleague, had been interviewed by the FBI the day after the assessination and shown a picture of Clay Shaw, and what I had reminded you of that I recalled, his having given the FBI a signed statement on Shaw. I have, in writing, from the Archives, that no such FBI reports exist in the Warren Commission materials.

It is almost a year now. Is it too late? If you call him, I'd like to be there to talk to him.

Let me know if you decide to call him, and if in advance of trial. I'll bring my pictures of the girl-friend he took to the camp when he told his "head hunters" it was all over and the transcript of her interview with me.

I have noted some inconsistencies in the things he said.

But the most obvious thing is how he cooled off when I phoned him three days later and he had changed his mind about everything. I have not found my notes on that. Is it safe to presume what I sent Garrison also cannot now be found in your files? If you do find it, please send me a copy.
