ASSASSINATION OF DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING By way of background, on 4/27/70 Assi ant Attorney General William Ruckelshaus, Civil Division, Department Justice, advised the Director that Harold Weisberg, the author of the b as "Whitewash I" and "Whitewash II," has filed a civil action against the 1 partment of Justice and Department of State demanding copies of all the pay s which were employed in the extradition in the James Earl Ray matter. I se documents were used in the extradition proceedings against James Earl in England and were thereafter returned to the State Department and we. transferred to the Department of Justice. Included in the documents e a considerable number of affidavits of FBI Agents, affidavits covering fing prints, ballistics' examinations, etc. Ruckelshaus asked if the releaof these documents to Weisberg would in any way prejudice the work of the BI. It is noted that Weisberg is an author who has been extremely crit! l of the FBI, the Secret Service and other police agencies in books which he as written about the assassination of President Kennedy.
