Harris wanted to know if this was correct. I told Shanklin to make no comment until I got back in touch with him. This matter was discussed with Mr. Belmont and cleared with the Director. I called Shanklin back at 10:15 a.m. and told him that in view of the fact that the Sheriff's Office or Police Department had "leaked" this matter, Shanklin should immediately call Harris back and also answer any further inquiries along the lines of affirming the fact that we did receive an anonymous telephone call and that we immediately notified the Police Department and the Sheriff's Office.
