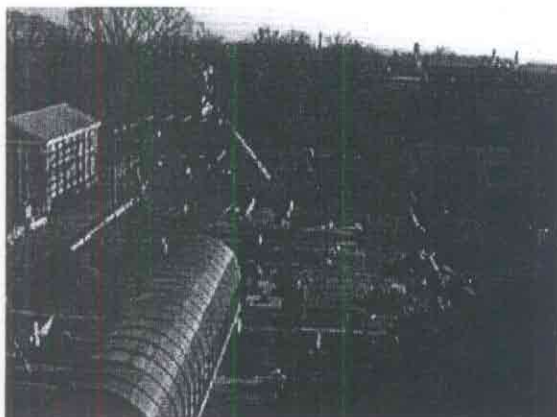

As of October 1996, GoreCam was one of only three WebCams in the State of Delaware.

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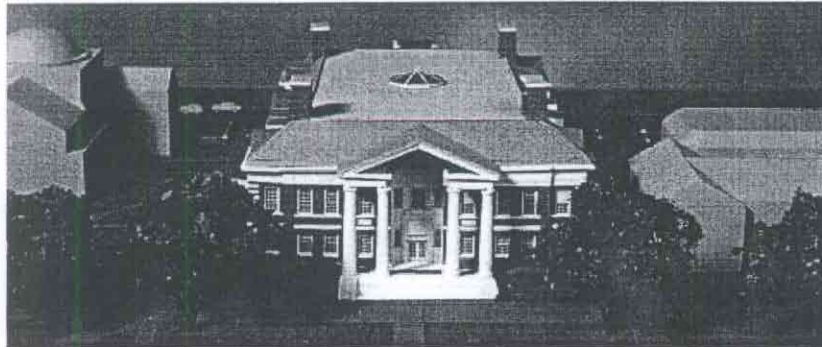
The first addition to the tree-lined heart of the campus in 35 years is ongoing with the construction of Gore Hall, a new classroom building made possible through the generosity of alumnus and trustee Robert W. Gore, alumna Sarah I. Gore and long-time friend Genevieve W. Gore of Newark.

Gore Hall is being built on the Mall between Mitchell Hall and Sharp Laboratory and will be connected by the overhead walkway across South College Avenue to the classroom/office building, Smith Hall. The new facility will feature a range of classroom styles and sizes, and the capacity for the latest technology for teaching has been incorporated into its design.

With their gift--one of the most significant in the history of the University--the Gores join the ranks of the University's most generous benefactors, H. Rodney Sharp, H. Fletcher Brown and P.S. du Pont.

President David P. Roselle called the Gore family gift "a remarkable one to the family of the University." He said it's fitting that their generous support is being used to complete the campus core, as it was envisioned nearly a century ago by the distinguished architects, Frank Miles Day and Charles A. Klauder, who prepared a campus development plan in the early 1900s.

Architect's Model

<b>Size</b>	65,000 square feet
<b>Architect</b>	Allan Greenberg, internationally respected architect known for his love of the classical style; perhaps best known for his design of a U.S. Department of State suite that recreates the character of rooms in which Thomas Jefferson would feel at home.
<b>Design Elements</b>	Keystones, jack arches over the windows, a doric portico, rustication, string courses and the same color and pattern of brickwork found in other Mall buildings.
<b>Projected Completion</b>	January 1998
<b>Cost</b>	Approximately \$17.5 million, donated by members of the Gore Family.
<b>Construction Manager</b>	EDiS
<b>Mechanical/Electrical Engineers</b>	Cosentini Associates Inc.
<b>Structural Engineers</b>	Harrison-Hamnett
<b>Civil Engineers</b>	Tetra Tech Inc.
