Rubin Accuses FBI of Raid

NEW YORK—Jerry Rubin, one of the defendants in the "Chicago Seven" conspiracy trial, says an FBI agent stormed into his apartment without a search warrant.

The FBI had "no comment."

Free on bail pending appeal of his conviction and five-month jail sentence, Rubin said an agent identifying himself as Ron McHaffey broke into his Greenwich Village apartment Thursday and after a 10-minute search, vowed: "We're going to come back and tear this place apart."

Rubin appeared yesterday in Chicago before Cook County Magistrate John J. Moran who continued state charges of resisting arrest and disorderly conduct still pending against the Yippie leader since the 1968 Democratic National Convention.
