

## Infiltrator Describes Riot Plots

CHICAGO, Aug. 31 (UPI)—

A policeman who infiltrated the protest movement here during the Democratic National Convention has revealed how organization leaders "planned rioting and how they constantly sought to provoke attacks upon them by police," the Chicago Tribune said in a copyrighted story.

The undercover agent, the newspaper said, also told of orders "to make every effort to involve news media so they would sympathize" with militant demonstrators; of overhearing a leader urging the murder of "one or two 'pigs'" (policemen); and of the placing of narcotics in cream-filled cookies and handing them to "unsuspecting demonstrators."

Robert L. Pierson, 35, on leave to serve as an investigator for the State's Attorney's office, told the Tribune that he grew a beard, rented a motorcycle, went underground and beat up several hippies to break into the hierarchy of the demonstration movement.

The newspaper said Pierson, who became known as Bob "Big Man" Lavin, became a bodyguard of Jerry Rubin, a leader in the Students for a Democratic Society, and sat in on important planning sessions with protest leaders and marshals.

Pierson, the newspaper said, left notes for detectives and was able to tip off authorities on the plans of the hippies and Yippies (members of the Youth International Party, a group closely aligned with the SDS and the hippies).
