

The Kennedy Assassination: A Case Study in the Use of Demonstrative and Forensic Evidence

PROGRAM

Recent technological innovations in the fields of demonstrative and forensic evidence have opened to lawyers exciting new ways in which to present evidence in the courtroom. These new tools, including the use of techniques such as computer animation, acoustical sound tracking, and neutron activation testing, are persuasive means to better assist trial lawyers in the presentation of factual disputes.

Using the 1963 assassination of President John F. Kennedy as a case study, this program will use state-of-the-art tools of demonstrative and forensic evidence to explore the issue of how many people actually shot at the President. Two distinguished panels will debate this issue using these new technological innovations. Included in this program will be direct and cross-examination of two medical experts who studied the actual autopsy photographs and x-rays from the Kennedy Assassination.

The program will explore such issues as:

- ☐ How computer animation can be used as a powerful advocacy tool
- ☐ How photographs and film can be analyzed with precision
- ☐ How forensic evidence can provide a window to a past event
- ☐ How new sciences such as acoustics and neutron activation testing can be used in the courtroom
- ☐ How to effectively use models, diagrams, and charts
- ☐ How the law of evidence deals with these new sciences and visual aids

FACULTY

Michael Baden, M.D. - Dr. Baden served as Chief of the Forensic Pathology Panel for the House Select Committee on Assassinations. He is the former Chief Medical Examiner of the City of New York. Dr. Baden currently serves as Director of Forensic Sciences for the New York State Police.

William F. Causey - Mr. Causey is an Adjunct Professor of Trial Practice at Georgetown University Law Center. He has lectured extensively on the use of computer animation in the courtroom. A former chair of the Litigation Section of the District of Columbia Bar, Mr. Causey currently is a partner in the law firm of Falk & Causey.

T. Mark Flanagan, Jr. - Mr. Flanagan served as a member of the House Select Committee on Assassinations, concentrating on medical evidence and organized crime. He served as a federal prosecutor in the District of Columbia. Mr. Flanagan currently is a partner in the Washington, D.C. office of McKenna & Cuneo.

Wesley J. Liebel - Mr. Liebel is a Professor of Law at UCLA Law School. In 1964, he served as Assistant Counsel to the Warren Commission. Professor Liebel has written and spoken extensively on the assassination.

Donald A. Purdy, Jr. - Mr. Purdy served as Senior Staff Counsel to the House Select Committee on Assassinations, concentrating on the medical evidence and direction of shots. He formerly served as a federal prosecutor in Philadelphia. Mr. Purdy currently is Chief Deputy General Counsel to the U.S. Sentencing Commission.

Cyril H. Wecht, M.D., J.D. - Dr. Wecht has lectured extensively on the medical aspects of the Kennedy Assassination. He is the author of numerous books and articles on medical-legal issues, is certified by the American Board of Pathology, and is a member of many distinguished medical societies. Dr. Wecht currently serves as Chairman of the Department of Pathology at Central Medical Center and Hospital in Pittsburgh.
