MY THOUGHTS RE PRESIDENT J. F. KENNEDY ASSASSINATION

I am the Chief Consultant for the US Army in wound ballistics at the Edgew Arsenal and Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland. I have been dealing with high velocity missiles for the Army for the past twenty-five years and I for that there are no forensic pathologists in this country who have had these perience I have had with this type of missile. The forensic pathologist is civilian life, deals primarily with homicides caused by slow velocity miss

I appeared before the investigating team of the Warren Commission at the valuable of the Washington, D.C. on April 21, 1964. At that time, I reviewed the X-rays and Zapruder film along with Governor Connaley, his wife and hi doctors. At that time, Governor Connaley sat on my right, while reviewing the Zapruder films and he (Governor Connaley) specifically told me, that he had know that his wrist was injured until he reacted fully from anesthesti and noted a plaster cast on his right hand and forearm but, in an interviewith Life magazine he goes on to say how his wrist was injured.

I am disturbed as to why I was not asked by the Warren Commission to give testimony, even though Doctors Olivier and Dzimean, to whom I serve as the Consultant were called, to give final testimony. I had advised these doct to conduct certain experiments at Edgewood- which they did- and their find were not consistent with their testimony.

Ir. Olivier accepts Dr. Gregory's impression of what was the entrance and was the exit wounds of Connaley's right wrist, in spite of the fact, that experiments on ten (10) cadaver wrists proved just the opposite-yet, he is willing to accept the conclusions of Gregory, who has no wound ballistic experimence. This is extremely important, as he then tries to fit the yaw and the tumbling effects to coincide with Gregory's interpretations—this is wrong and this is the part of the investigation that has been criticized a bitterly in medical circles. Personally, I strongly believe that the wrist wound is a separate and distinct wound made by one of the shots by Oswald. Also—this bullet is not deformed and yet, the bullets that struck the cad ver wrists are badly deformed, and these same bullets did not go through a neck or through a chest wall. In the experiments on ten cadaver wrists, a the exit wounds are larger than the entrance wounds—this is a known fact yet. Dr. Olivier chose to accept Gregory's thoughts of Connaley's wound as opposite.

I feel that the first bullet fired by Oswald went through the President's neck and caused him to become paralyzed even though the bullet did not strike the spine. This is due to the fact that you can have an injury to the spinal cord with high velocity missiles without the missiles striking the cord, because of the large temporary cavity produced by high velocity siles. I can demonstrate amd prove this fact by several films which we have loped at the Edgewood Arsenal. The autopsy should have included a se of the cervical spinal cord, which I am sure would have demonstrated a he orrhage.

I am convinced that the one bullet theory is wrong, because of the fact, one bullet striking the President's neck, the Governor's chest and wrist, should be badly deformed, as our experiments at the Edgewood Arsenal provathere never was a bullet in Governor Connaley's left thigh, but just a smarragement which I feel came from the third bullet which struck J.F.K. in the head. My testimony on the one bullet theory are clearly written in Dr. Thompson's book- "Six Seconds in Dallas" on pages 152 and 206.

I feel that the sequence of the bullets is as follows:

- 1- The first bullet went through JFK's neck and this is the so-
- 2- The second bullet went through Governor Connaley's chest and wrist and the film clearly demonstrates Connaley's wrist against his chest wall. I feel that this is the bullet that is missing
- 3- The third bullet struck JFK in the head and one fragment of this bullet struck Connaley in the left thigh and also struck the windshield of the car
- 8- I feel that Oswald was the sole assassin who fired the three shots.
- 9- This is not an unusual deduction with high velocity missiles and we are compounding this investigation because it happens to be the President of the U.S. who was assassinated.
- 10- I have waited so long to express my thoughts, because I did not realize to the testimony given by my colleagues at Edgewood, was so different from what we had discussed and proved by experiments at Edgewood.

Ballistics Expert Criticizes Show On JFK Death

RIVIERA BEACH - The U.S. Army's chief expert on wound bal-listics and a consultant to the War-ren Commission which investigated the assassination of President Kennedy yesterday criticized a recent television program on the myster-ies surrounding the assassination.

However, Dr. Joseph Dolce, a Riviera Beach surgeon, repeated his call for full disclosure of the Warren Commission report and for a new inquiry into the circum-stances of Kennedy's death in Dal-las more than 11 years ago.

"There are so many doubts, so many theories that have been advanced, and for these reasons I feel another investigation should be made," Dr. Dolce said yesterday.

Dr. Dolce, who "investigated the assassination four months later in Washington from the basis of ballistics;" said he was "very much disappointed" with Thursday night's "Goodnight America" program on ABC. The program, hosted by newsman Geraldo Rivera, was a 50-minute discussion of recent theories of the assassination, with most of the guests claiming wound trajectories indicate more than on person shot Kennedy during his moperson shot Kennedy during his mo-torcade and urging Congress to un-dertake a new probe.

"If the American people are led to believe what was on that pro-gram; he said "they have an en-tirely different concept of what took place."

He refused to comment on activist-comedian Dick Gregory's theory that the assassination may have been a CIA-backed operation. Gregory appeared on the ABC program and previously released photos he said show Howard Hunt and Frank Sturgis, of Watergate-CIA fame, in Dalias on the day Kennedy was shot.

However, Dr. Dolce said, "I'm sure some type of conspiracy was involved.

"I definitely believe that Oswald was the only man who did the shooting. But I also feel it was a very well-planned murder, I feel a conspiracy was involved and I feel Oswald was not brilliant enough to plan such a perfect assassination."

Dr. Doice added, "I have always feit Castro himself was involved because of (Kennedy's involvement in) the Bay of Pigs. But I have always been disturbed that if the true facts were known, America would get up in arms."

"President Kennedy was so well liked by the American people that I think it would create mass hysteria in this country if they knew the true reasons for his assassination."

The Warren Commission's full report will not be made public until the year 2000. "I hope I live long enough to see the full report," Dr. Dolce said.

He said there is a possibility the investigation may be reopened two or three years from now. A Senate intelligence committee was reported Friday to be considering an investigation of charges of a CIA-Kennedy assassination link.
