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LOS ANGELES (AP)— Novelist Leon Uris has testifled that the French secret service agent who collabo-rated with him on his spy novel "Topaz" hoped his revelations would set off a reaction in France that would allow the agent to return home a hero.

Uris is being sued for \$2 million by the agent, Phillippe de Vosjoli, who says the author violated a contract, which provided an even split of royalties and film proceeds from the book.

In Superior Court Wednesday Uris said De Vosjoli, 51, wanted to expose

fileged Communist influ-once in the French secret service so he could return home a hero.

Uris, 47, admits there was a contract, but says De Vos-joli violated it himself by selling some of his material

selling some of his material to Life, Look, and the Sun-day London Times.

The two men worked to-gether in 1955 on a novel based on De Vosjoll's expe-riences as head of the French Deuxieme Bureau in the United States. De Vos-joli said that during the Cuban missile crises he discovered his agency was heavily infiltrated by Communists.
