Dear Harold Weisberg:

After a long hiatus, I have begun my own armchair research into the Kennedy assassination. I obtained your address from the bibliography of High Treason, although your name has been familiar to me for years. I am 31 years old, and was less than six months old when John F. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas.

Please forgive the disorganization of this letter. I am not working from a prepared outline or notes, I am just sitting down at the computer and typing questions as I think of them. I have obtained paperback copies of two of your books, Whitewash and Oswald in New Orleans, and have seen you on television specials about the Kennedy and King assassinations.

One of my questions deals with a person from Oswald's Marine Corps background, whom I remember you mentioning only once in Oswald in New Orleans. The person is Kerry Thornley, a Marine Corps buddy of Oswald's at the Marine base at Santa Ana, California. Thornley is unusual in that he is the only person who wrote about Oswald before 22 November 1963. Just this week, a copy of The Idle Warriors, his novel about Oswald, arrived in the mail for me here, and I have been reading it voraciously.

I do remember that the late Jim Garrison gave Thornley quite a rough time in his own investigation in New Orleans. I am wondering what information you have on Thornley--I have read odd articles about him in the computerized editions of the Atlanta newspaper, and read a bizarre essay of his, "Is Paranoia a Form of Awareness?", in a recent book called Secret and Suppressed. It seems that he has been pretty much down on his luck for much of the past decade or so. In addition, I have been trying without success, literally for years, to obtain a copy of his small book, Oswald. If you know anyone who has a copy they are willing to sell, tell me when you write to me!

A fellow amateur researcher has told me that he heard mention of a diary kept by David Ferrie that disappeared shortly after he died. I admit that I have not read Oswald in New Orleans thoroughly, and its lack of an index is a hindrance, but I have never heard any mention of a diary. Also, I am at a loss to understand Ferrie's primary source of income for much of the time of his life from his dismissal from Eastern Airlines until the time of his death.
