This lengthy self-congratulatory piece has as its prime thesis the rep-ehensibility of the DA's methods of gathering evidence and the worthlessness of the witnesses in whom the case for the presecution of Clay L. Shaw is based. (Ed. note: Shaw is the New Orleans businessman Garrison belives conspired to shoot the President.)

Epstein travelled to New Orleans and as a member of the original band of critics of the Warren Report, whose book "Inquest" was a bestseller, he was welcomed as an ally by the District Attorney, who has had more than his share of difficulties in bringing Shaw to


