

Report Oswald Agent For FBI Once Topic Of Warren Panel

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Warren Commission discussed a report that Lee Harvey Oswald had worked as an FBI undercover agent for a year before the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, according to a recently declassified commission transcript.

Members of the commission including the late Chief Justice Earl Warren and President Ford, who was then a Michigan congressman, discussed the report at a closed session on Jan. 22, 1963.

The transcript, released in a 1992 declassification, was obtained by Harold Weisberg, an author who had used

the Freedom of Information Act. Weisberg has written numerous books and articles, including the Warren Commission investigation and Oswald's alleged FBI work. He also has written Kennedy's assassination on Nov.

22, 1963. A copy of the transcript was obtained by The Associated Press.
