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FBI Records Said to Link Exner, Mob

SAN DIEGO, June 11 (AP)—FBI reports released at the demand of Judith Exner link her definitely with underworld figures, a U. S. attorney said today. But the names of others, including that of a congressman, are deleted from the reports released by a court order.

In a news conference last December, Exner said she carried on "a relationship" with the late President Kennedy and organized crime figure Sam Giancana. She filed suit Feb. 6 to gain access to the FBI files for help in writing her memoirs.

The files, which appeared to have been sharply edited, were released in response to an order by U. S. District Court Judge Edward J. Schwartz. The FBI fought to

keep the files secret but the Ninth U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco upheld Schwartz's order.

Assistant U. S. Attorney John Neece said the 28-page FBI summary mentions Exner, usually under her first married name of Judith Campbell, in a total of 92 reports made by the FBI between 1962 and last January.

The summary does not mention Kennedy, with whom Exner says she had a relationship from 1960 to 1962. The report refers to Giancana as "a leader of organized crime in this country." Giancana was shot to death execution-style last year in his Chicago home. Exner has said her last conversation with him was in late 1964.

The summary excludes

many of the FBI's reports on grounds of confidentiality of sources, investigations in progress and administrative reasons. A report linking Exner with Johnny Roselli, described in the summary as "a reputed West Coast syndicate hoodlum," is withheld completely.

There are numerous blocked out names, including a vague reference to a U. S. congressman and another to a political figure who "admitted having affairs with a number of women, including Judy Campbell."

The reference to the congressman is contained in a 1962 report that indicated that in the week prior to May 14, 1962, Exner had received "a call from an un-

named congressman who had described her as a romantic figure and said he wished to get acquainted with her."

The reports describe numerous meetings between Exner and Roselli, including a 1962 Los Angeles meeting at the Beverly Crest Hotel in which Exner paid \$600 in cash for her hotel bill. The name of a New York man described as "a top hoodlum" is deleted.

Exner, now 41, was interviewed by FBI agents in May, 1961, concerning her relationship with Giancana, the summary said. Exner claims that she met Giancana about 15 months before that time.

Exner now lives with her husband in San Diego.
