Mr. Boggs, the Democratic whip of the House, took part in the Columbia Broadcasting Sys-tem's "Face the Nation," tele-cast from Washington. He de-fended the commission's finding that Lee Harvey Oswald alone assassinated Mr. Kennedy. Asked if the evidence against

Asked if the evidence against Oswald—who was himself killed two days later-would been legally sufficient, Boggs declared: -would have Mr

"I don't think there is any question about the fact that he could have been convicted of first-degree murder." As to any new inquiry, Mr.

Boggs said: "If the objective of the investigation is to pursue new evidence, that is one thing. If the objective is to answer some of the things that have been raised in to the present, 1 would say that I would have grave questions about it-ex-cept for the autopsy or X-rays."

Thorn-ton Boswell, who took part in the autopsy, said the X-rays and photographs of the President's body-placed in the Na-tional Archives Oct. 31-would would verify the location of a disputed wound at the back base of the neck. But he noted that medical interpretation would remain necessary to trace the path of a bullet through the body and out the front.
