Kelley Argues For Domestic Wiretapping

SEATTLE, Aug. 30 (UPI)—FBI Chief Clarence Kelley says the case of Patricia Hearst and the Symbionese Liberation Army is an example of why the FBI should be allowed wiretaps in domestic security cases.

His agency has been authorized to make wiretaps in some criminal cases, he said, "and they have been very useful."

He said he would like to see legislation extending wiretapping authority to revolutionaries.

"For example, in the SLA case, we cannot put a wiretap on them because they are a domestic security matter," he said.

Kelley said the FBI's image has suffered from the fact that Miss Hearst, the kidnaped laughter of the president of the San Francisco Examiner, has not been found.
