

Few Clues In Williams Burglary

Montgomery County police said yesterday they have few clues in their investigation of the burglary of the Potomac home of Edward Bennett Williams, Washington lawyer and president of the Washington Redskins football team, whose house was ransacked during the game on Sunday.

Detectives handling the case said last night they had located some fingerprints but had no suspects in the case and have made no arrests.

Williams said Sunday night that his briefcase and legal papers kept at his home had been stolen, along with some valuable pieces of his wife's jewelry. He said the burglary took place sometime between 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. while no one was at the home.

Williams is a partner in the law firm of Williams, Connolly & Califano, which is handling some lawsuits stemming from the Watergate break-in. In addition, Williams is representing Robert Vesco, the international financier indicted with former Attorney General John N. Mitchell and former Commerce Secretary Maurice Stans in a case involving campaign contributions.

On Sunday, Williams described the legal materials kept at his home as "sensitive," but said he was not sure what had been taken. His office secretary said yesterday Williams would not comment further on the burglary.
