Oswald's Mother To Resume Talk

WASHINGTON BUREAU
WASHINGTON—The Warren Commission members are most dubious of Mrs. Marguerite Oswald's attempt "to produce evidence" of her son's innocence of the assassination of President Kennedy. The Times Herald learned Tuesday.

Chief Justice Earl Warren, who heads the presidential commission, has announced that Mrs. Oswald's testimony shows "nothing new that would change the picture as I see it."

The chief justice even added that the commission has learned Mrs. Oswald had no contact with her son, Lee Harvey Oswald, for "around a year" prior to the Nov. 22 assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

The stout, grey-haired mother flew into Washington Sunday night proclaiming she would produce evidence for the commission to prove her son's innocence.

She tried to speak to the press Monday after testifying before the commission but demurred after her lawyer, John Doyle of Washington, recommended against any statements.

Mrs. Oswald has told the commission about her son's life from his Russian stay until his death, Chief Justice Warren said.

But, we haven't discussed

that," he said, when asked if Mrs. Oswald had claimed her son innocent of the assassination.

FIRST DEFENSE WITNESS

Oswald panel hears mother

LEE HARVEY OSWALD, the man accused of assassinating President Kennedy, was defended Feb. 10 for the first time before the Presidential commission investigating the murder. His mother, Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, appeared before the seven-member panel in an effort to prove her son was innocent.

Chief Justice Earl Warren, commission head, said after the first day that Mrs. Oswald's testimony was "helpful," but that it contained "nothing that would change the picture as I see it." The picture, presumably, is that drawn by the FBI in a still-secret report, though portions have been leaked to the press, alleging that Oswald was the "lone and unaided gunman" who assassinated the President.

Mrs. Oswald, appearing with a court-appointed lawyer, spent the first day discussing her son's history and their personal relationship. She promised to return with information that would contradict the official belief that Oswald was guilty.

LANE PRESENT: On Feb. 11 Mrs. Oswald again presented evidence after discussing it with the commission counsel and attorney Mark Lane. Lane had flown to Washington from San Francisco, where he had been on a speaking tour under auspices of the GUARDIAN and other groups.

Since Mrs. Oswald was represented by John F. Doyle of Washington, Lane did not appear officially before the commission, but submitted in writing two questions which she answered.

One concerned the nature of her confinement at a motel in Texas. At one point, she said, she sought to leave the motel and was escorted back to her room, with a Secret Service man holding her by each arm.

THE GUN: The second question con-

cerned her discussion with Marina about Marina's questioning by the Dallas police Nov. 22 soon after Lee Oswald's arrest. She said Marina told her she was asked whether her husband had a gun. She answered in the affirmative. Then, when shown the alleged murder weapon, she was asked whether this was her husband's gun. Marina said, according to Mrs. Oswald: "I do not think that that is Lee's gun."

After his quick trip to Washington, Lane flew to Los Angeles for a meeting. He had spoken to 900 persons at a San Francisco meeting sponsored by the GUARDIAN Feb. 8 and to 1,000 students at an assembly at the University of California at Berkeley Feb. 10. Further speaking arrangements were scheduled for San

Diego, Detroit, Cleveland, Milwaukee and Madison, Wis. His speaking tour will conclude with a Town Hall meeting in New York the night of Feb. 18.

CENSORSHIP HINT: The commission heard Marina Oswald testify the week before. If the wife's testimony, as described by Warren, provided no great surprises, statements by the Chief Justice himself certainly did. Warren's unexpected declaration that some facts about the crime "may not be released in your lifetime"—though later qualified—served to excite the very speculation that the commission was created to dispel.

Mrs. Oswald's four-day testimony confirmed earlier reports leaked to the press by the Secret Service: "She stated that while she did not like to believe her husband killed President Kennedy, the facts presented to her since the assassination would not permit her to reach any other conclusion," Warren said Feb. 6. The widow was first said to be convinced of her husband's guilt on Jan. 7, six weeks during which she was held incommunicado by federal agents.

According to Warren, the 22-year-old widow identified 145 exhibits, including the alleged murder rifle, during about

that "nothing of this nature has appeared."

LINK TO CIA? It is not known, of course, exactly what aspects of "national security" are involved in the Oswald case, though it is being increasingly speculated in responsible circles that Oswald was being trained as an undercover operative for the FBI or Central Intelligence Agency. If this were true and made public, it would generate widespread national distrust of America's "security" apparatus.

The trial of Jack Ruby, the nightclub operator who killed Oswald in Dallas two days after Kennedy was shot, is scheduled for Feb. 17. He will plead insanity. Defense lawyer Melvin Belli began calling witnesses Feb. 11 in a pre-trial hearing in an effort to prove that Ruby would not receive a fair trial in Dallas.

In the last of a series of syndicated articles by Ruby, written with the assistance of reporter William Read Woodfield, the admitted executioner concluded: "Oswald was a dead man before I shot him." Ruby said he murdered Oswald after Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade stated that Oswald was guilty of killing Kennedy, indicating that he would not have done so had Wade not made his accusation.

20 hours of questioning before the commission. She was accompanied by her lawyer and the Secret Service agents who have been her constant companions since Oswald was arrested a few hours after Kennedy was shot in Dallas Nov. 22.

The commission is charged with evaluating evidence submitted by the FBI and other police agencies indicating that the 24-year-old ex-Marine was the "lone and unaided assassin" of President Kennedy, and allegedly fired three shots at the Presidential motorcade from the sixth floor of the Texas Book Depository where he was employed. Following its investigation, which probably will last several more months, the seven-member panel is to "report its findings and conclusions" to the public. Warren's statement after the second day of Marina Oswald's testimony, however, indicates that certain of the commission's findings may be withheld if they concern matters of national security. Asked by reporters when the testimony would be made public, Warren said:

"Yes, there will come a time (when it is released). But it might not be in your lifetime. I am not referring to anything especially, but there may be some things that would involve security. This would be preserved but not made public."

He further emphasized his statement by adding, "And I mean that seriously."

Curious Are Drawn To Hear Mrs. Oswald

Hours before Mrs. Marguerite Oswald was due to appear at Town Hall last night to defend her son, the crowd began to gather—the curious, the credulous, the hostile, the ones with angles of their own.

Most of them, including the sprinkling of women who wore mink and the men clothed in cashmere, merely wanted to hear what the mother of the man accused of slaying a President had to say.

"I guess like most people here I'm just curious," said playwright Lillian Hellman. "I'm dying of curiosity, I just want to see what she looks like," said Mrs. A. J. Liebling, widow of the writer.

"I'm more curious about this Mrs. Oswald than any other aspect of the case," said a man who would identify himself only as an International Business Machines executive.

Ticket Moochers, Too

As police formed the crowd into a line outside the hall on W. 43rd St., the ticket moochers who somehow can smell a sellout appeared. "Got an extra ticket?" they said softly as they moved up and down the line. They had little luck.

At the boxoffice, a girl said the appearance of Lee Oswald's mother and her lawyer, Mark Lane, had sold out the hall's 1500 seats by 6:30 p.m. and hundreds of would-be buyers had been turned away.

Walking back and forth in front of the hall were those who had a special axe to grind.

Some causes were easily identified — friends of the National Guardian, the left wing weekly that sponsored Mrs. Oswald's appearance, were pushing that publication.

Others were distributing literature that demanded justice in the Rosenberg-Sobell case, or asked for the reinstatement of five expelled supporters of the Socialist Workers party.

The crowd, orderly and even a little subdued outside the hall, brightened only slightly when they took their seats and Mrs. Oswald and Lane appeared on stage.

Lane Plays Recording

Lane spoke first, and played a tape recording he said had been made by a Dallas teacher who was

nessed the assassination of President Kennedy. The woman said she had heard shots come from an overpass ahead of the President's car. Lane said this meant the fatal shots had not come from the warehouse in which police have placed Oswald at the time of the slaying. He went on to vilify the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Secret Service and the Dallas police, and sat down to a patter of applause.

Mrs. Oswald, in a black, two-piece dress, black shoes and stockings, her gray hair in a bun, got up and said an injustice had been done, and that she would fight to correct it.

"I cannot help my son," she said. "He is gone and I accept that fact, but the way in which he is gone I will never accept."

Describing herself as a "humble" woman "who believes in the American way of life," she vowed that this was the first

Mrs. Oswald At Town Hall

Mrs. Marguerite Oswald strongly defended her son last night before 1,500 persons at Town Hall against the accusation that he assassinated President Kennedy.

She said she accepted the fact that Lee Harvey Oswald "is gone. But the way he went I'll never accept . . ."

She says she has asked to see her daughter-in-law Marina but that the Secret Service has refused her request.

No Tears

For the most part she talks of her son with an air of detachment. But when she reads a letter she sent to President Johnson—"You lost a friend . . . I lost a son . . . We are both human beings . . . We breathe the same air"—she chokes up and for the first time appears ready to cry. But she recovers quickly and there are no tears. And suddenly the reason is clear. Public figures don't cry. And Mrs. Marguerite Oswald is a public figure.

She listens to attorney Mark Lane and others attempt to shoot holes through the FBI story of the assassination and she picks up words like "scapegoat" and it comes out "scrapgoat." But she is a quick learner, and very much her own woman.

"I carried on this fight alone from the start and I'm going to continue to carry the fight," she says. "My son is innocent until proved guilty. That's the American way of life. My son was not on the FBI list of suspicious persons in Dallas. There is every possibility he worked for the CIA. Why else would he have posed openly as a leftist and a Marxist, if not to get in with these organizations and find out what they were doing?"

"This young man — whether he's my son or a stranger —

repeatedly declares, 'I didn't do it, I didn't do it.' And he's shot down. That's not the American way of life. A man is innocent until he's proved guilty."

Waiting on Lane

Like the Town Hall audience, Mrs. Oswald is awaiting further elaboration by Lane of his assertion last night that a week before the assassination, Dallas right-winger Bernard Weissman met with Ptlm J. D. Tippit and an unidentified third man in the Carousel, the striptease club operated by Jack Ruby. Weissman placed the full-page anti-Kennedy ad the day the President was assassinated. Officer Tippit was slain, allegedly by Oswald. Ruby is now on trial for Oswald's murder. Lane says he'll name the third man, "within a matter of weeks."

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LANE GIVES VIEWS TO WARREN PANEL

Public Hearing Is Held at Request of Lawyer

WASHINGTON, March 4 (UPI)—The Presidential commission investigating the assassination of President Kennedy held its first public hearing today at the request of a New York lawyer.

The request was made by Mark Lane, a former New York Assemblyman who claims to represent the President's accused assassin, Lee Harvey Oswald.

Chief Justice Earl Warren, who heads the commission, opened the session at the commission's headquarters building by saying that Mr. Lane's request for the hearing was thoroughly agreeable to the commission.

"The commission does not operate in a secret way," Mr. Warren said.

He asserted that the hearings had been limited to the "quiet of our rooms" because it was felt that this would speed the hearings and avoid inconvenience.

"The purpose of this commission," Mr. Warren said, "is to make known to the President and the American public all of the testimony we have received. All of it will be made available at an appropriate time."

Mr. Lane, who has frequently challenged the view that Oswald was guilty of shooting Mr. Kennedy, told the commission he had heard of a secret meeting in a Dallas night club eight days before the President was killed.

Present at the meeting, he said, were J. D. Tippitt, the Dallas patrolman who was slain while trying to arrest Oswald; Bernard Weissman, a Mount Vernon, N. Y., resident who had placed an anti-Kennedy advertisement in a Dallas newspaper the day the President was shot, and an unidentified third person.

The meeting, Mr. Lane said, was held on Nov. 14 in the Carousel Club, a night club owned by Jack Ruby, now on trial in Dallas for the murder of Oswald.

The hearing room was cleared of newsmen and spectators when Mr. Lane said he would rather give the name of the third person present at the meeting to the commission in private.

When the public session resumed, Justice Warren denied Mr. Lane's request to serve as Oswald's defense counsel before the commission, with the right to examine witnesses and have access to the commission's documents.

Asked what the purpose of the Dallas meeting was, Mr. Lane said the three persons spent more than two hours conferring. He said his information did not indicate what they were talking about.

Mr. Lane also told the commission that photographs of Oswald holding a rifle and wearing a pistol on his hip were "obviously doctored" before they were printed in newspapers and magazines.

Mr. Lane's contention that a secret meeting had been held in Dallas was first made at a public meeting on Feb. 18 in Town Hall at which Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, the accused assassin's mother, appeared.

Although he mentioned the names of Mr. Tippitt and Mr. Weissman at the Town Hall meeting, Mr. Lane did not make public the third person's identity.

Mr. Weissman, asked to comment after Mr. Lane first made his charge, said he had never met Mr. Tippitt, Ruby or Oswald. He also said he had never been in the Carousel.

"As far as I know," Mr. Weissman said at that time, "anybody I associated with in Dallas never had any such meeting."

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Oswald's Mother Defends Him

Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, sometimes nervously fingering a novena medal around her neck, came to this hometown of President Kennedy Wednesday night to try to vindicate her son accused of killing him.

Frequently during a two-hour radio and press interview, Mrs. Oswald referred to "Lee Harvey Oswald" as if she were some lawyer pleading his defense.

Over and over again, she recited her message:

"Lee Harvey Oswald did not assassinate President Kennedy. Lee Harvey Oswald was murdered without benefit of trial and counsel, and that is contrary to the American way of life. I believe that the nation should know if the assassins are still at large."

Mrs. Oswald, a comfy-looking woman of 56, was interviewed on WBZ radio's "Bob Kennedy's Contact" program.

The program invites questions from telephone callers, and there were some Wednesday night who were angry that Mrs. Oswald was here at all.

Others questioned Mrs. Oswald's method of financing her lecture forays, and she was quick to retort:

"I am not making money on the dead body of my son. I believe I am the only member of the Oswald family who can say that"

WBZ declared it gave Mrs. Oswald \$50 for her round-trip transportation between New York and Boston and for her hotel room here Wednesday night.

Twice during the press interview after the broadcast, the subject of money or her lack of it brought tears to Mrs. Oswald's eyes.

She pointed out that she had only \$863 from Lee Harvey Oswald's inheritance and that she was fired from her job as a practical nurse because of her son's notoriety.

Mrs. Oswald wore a black suit dress, a single strand of pearls, pearl earrings and dark-rimmed eyeglasses. She said the novena medal on a chain around her neck was sent her by a group who "prayed for

Lee." She said she has received many similar signs of sympathy since Lee was shot by nightclub owner Jack Ruby two days after President Kennedy's death.

At the outset of the program, Mrs. Oswald vowed to reveal hitherto unknown information which would support her claim that Lee was not a traitor to his country, but on the contrary an agent working for the United States government.

This information was that Lee had joined the Civil Air Patrol at age 15, during which service he met a man who influenced him to join the Marines; that Lee quit school to do so, against his mother's wishes and that three days after he signed up in the Marines he defected to Russia, from then on to become an agent in this government's service.

Mrs. Oswald said she was beyond any personal feelings for Jack Ruby, now on trial for Oswald's murder, but that, "I hope Lee Harvey Oswald knew Jack Ruby because that will prove Lee was an agent for this government."

She stuck to her story that an FBI man showed her a photo of Jack Ruby before Ruby shot and killed her son. "Hoover, (J. Edgar, head of the FBI), acknowledged they showed a picture but said it was not of Jack Ruby."

Mrs. Oswald said the photo was shown her cupped in the hand of an FBI man who visited her and Lee's Russian wife, Marina, in their room at the Executive Inn in Dallas on Nov. 23, the day before Lee was shot.

Mrs. Oswald said she decided the photo was of Ruby after seeing his picture in the newspapers after he killed her son. "It was the same picture, but greatly enlarged," she maintained.

She said she thought the Warren Commission investigating the murder of the President was trying to do a fair job, "but I don't see how they can make any true conclusions without allowing cross-examination of witnesses." Possibly a "congressional" commission would have been better, she said.

Marguerite Oswald admitted daughter-in-law and sons have been strained of late. "I do not know where Marina is," she said. "This is no mother-in-law rift. The Secret Service has refused to let me see her, her relationship with her son." "She is innocent and I think he's innocent. We are all entitled to our own opinion."

Mrs. Oswald said she will go on speaking wherever the opportunity is offered her. She said she has already made a recording of letters sent her by Lee Harvey Oswald and that she will write a book about him soon.

"Lee wasn't perfect, but he was not the louse the papers made him out to be," his mother said.

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Oswald's Mother Calls Ruby Fate Harmful to Son

DALLAS, Tex., Mar. 14 (AP). —Mrs. Marguerite Oswald said today she wished the jury had sentenced Jack Ruby to life imprisonment rather than to death in the electric chair.

"I want him alive," she said of the man who killed her son. "I want him alive because I believe Jack Ruby was a paid killer who deprived my son of his trial. I am confident I can prove there are things to be brought out.

"I also do not believe in capital punishment. I would have preferred him to get life imprisonment without parole."

Mrs. Oswald talked calmly to reporters while she drank iced tea in a nearby shop.

"I cannot say I was surprised at the verdict. I think the jury did what it thought best.

"I intend to continue speaking in my son's cause," Mrs. Oswald said. "There is much more to work with now that the Ruby trial is finished."

Her next speaking engagement, she said, will be on a television panel program in Chicago on March 25.

MOTHER OF OSWALD ENDS TIE WITH LANE

Mrs. Marguerite C. Oswald said here yesterday that she had dismissed Mark Lane, her New York lawyer.

Mr. Lane had sought, before the Warren Commission, to clear her late son, Lee H. Oswald, of the charge of assassinating President Kennedy. Oswald was killed by Jack Ruby in Dallas Nov. 24, a few days after the assassination.

At the Beekman Tower Hotel, Mrs. Oswald said she had asked Mr. Lane to send her a copy of his report to the commission and to stop any "organized campaign" on behalf of her son through his "Citizens Committee of Inquiry."

She received no contributions from an appeal she made in Chicago March 21, to pay for an office, investigator and a stenographer, she said, because people mistakenly believed she was affiliated with that committee.

Last Jan. 11 Mr. Lane agreed to represent her, free of charge, in collecting information on the shooting of the President and her son and presenting it to the commission.

"I consider your work finished, and hereby terminate your representation," Mrs. Oswald told him in a letter to committee headquarters, 156 Fifth Avenue. She praised his work.

Mr. Lane agreed to end the relationship and promised to send Mrs. Oswald a copy of his report.

"In due course, all of the facts will be presented to the American people despite the fact that your son was denied the right to a trial," he told her.

NOTE:

Subject has exhibited behavior since the assassination that she is emotionally unstable. She is telling any one who will listen to her that her son was not the assassin or was not involved alone in the assassination. She has contacted our FBI Office in Dallas on a number of occasions to furnish information she feels is of value. We are accepting information she furnishes but are conducting no investigation of her. For filing purposes and for ready reference in the future, desirable we maintain a separate file on subject. Heretofore information concerning her has been filed in the main case file of Lee Harvey Oswald.
