Seeks to Find Agents Who Kept the Facts From Him

WASHINGTON, Aug. ♥8-Clarence M. Kelley, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said today that he had been deliberately "deceived" by aides who withheld from him knowledge of a number of illegal burglaries carried out by the bureau's agents in recent

Mr. Kelley termed the matter "cause for concern," and said that he was investigating to determine which of his subordinates had played a role in the

deception.

"And if I find those who have knowledgeably, knowingly, intentionally deceived me, I will take some action," he said.

The 64-year-old director issued a statement last June 30

Continued on Page 9, Column 1 rescinding his previous assurances that no such burglaries by his agents had occurred since 1966, when the practice was ostensibly halted by his predecessor, the late J. Edgar Hoover.

But Mr. Kelley leveled no criticism at others at that time and implied in a statement that the recent burglaries, in 1972 and 1973 in the New York City area, had come to light only after documents alluding to them had been discovered in the bureau's Manhattan Offices.

Burglaries Denied

Although Mr. Kelley said today that he had "not found out who" had withheld information from him, Justice Department sources have said that he had established the deather of at least one bursay. identity of at least one bureau official who knew of the recent burglaries at the time that Mr. Kelley maintained, at a news conference in July 1975, that there had been none.
