You appealed from the action of the Milwaukee Field Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation on your request for access to records pertaining to yourself.


After careful consideration of your appeal, I have decided to affirm the initial action in this case. You have already received all substantive information in Milwaukee Field Office files within the scope of your request. No page was withheld from you in its entirety. Only the name of a confidential informant was withheld from documents concerning you. This excision was made pursuant to 5 U.S.C. 552(b)(7)(D), which pertains to investigatory records compiled for law enforcement purposes, the release of which would disclose the identity of a confidential source. This material is not appropriate for discretionary release.

Judicial review of my action on this appeal is available to you in the United States District Court for the judicial district in which you reside or have your principal place of business, or in the District of Columbia, or in the Eastern District of Wisconsin, which is where the records you seek are located.
