The AARC is alive & well in Washington. All of our collections are growing by leaps and bounds, thanks to the generosity of our many friends. We have been especially fortunate to receive the research materials of 20+ assassination scholars. AARC had an enormous surge in business in Sept-Nov, 1989; we assisted in the making of a dozen TV shows and helped with a slew of articles. We even got some excellent publicity on our own activities.

Probably our most noteworthy advance in 1988 was the expansion of our RFK collection. Due to the generosity of Ted Charach, we have on loan his magnificent and extensive set of materials. Additionally, we have the documents on the entire LAPD investigation, not only on microfilm but also "blown back" to hard copy and bound in 124 indexed volumes.

We are engaged in several "peripheral" activities. We are assisting Kevin Walsh and Mark Allen (Association for Advancement of Xistorical Research) in their efforts to have the records of the House Select Committee unfrozen. And Jim Lesar has filed an FO1A suit against the CIA for release of records relating to the connection, if any, between the Agency and George Bush prior to his becoming its Director; he flatly denies any such connection.

AARC's services to its members and to the public have been expanded. The most popular service has been the duplication of audio and UKS tapes. We now have about 50 video tapes and 1500 audio tapes, and we will be glad to duplicate them and send them to you for the cost of reproduction (\$10.00 UKS & \$5.00 audio). Let us know if there is a particular one that you need. We also have a lending library (two weeks free loan). And we still do "minor" research for members.

AARC's Annual Meeting of it Board of Directors will be held on June 3rd in Dallas (rather than Washington) to coincide with the opening of the new JFK Assassination Center....not to be confused with the pro-Warren Commission exhibit on the Sixth Floor. The new Center is the brain-child of Gary Shaw and Larry Howard. It will consist of a pro-conspiracy exhibit and sales area, a 40-seat theatre, and a JFK assassination research room. ASAP, the center will operate an assassination bus tour in Dallas. The Center is located in the West End Market Place Complex, three blocks from the TSBD; its mailing address is P.O.
