The communication from this Bureau dated April 5, 1972, informed you that we were conducting research regarding these documents.

On May 8, 1972, a representative of this Bureau discussed Congressman Ichord's request with the Congressman. It was determined that the request was actually on behalf of Ecrnard Fensterwald, Esquire, head of a private group called the "Committee to Investigate Assassinations." The Congressman stated that he intended to tell Fensterwald that he has seen the documents in question, both those originating with the Central Intelligence Agency and with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and they contain no information pertinent to Fenstervald's inquiry. Accordingly, no further action need be taken in this regard.
