

FERRIE ESTATE VALUE IS GIVEN

Garrison Probe Figure's
Assets \$1,585.68

David W. Ferrie, accused by District Attorney Jim Garrison of conspiracy in the murder of President John F. Kennedy, left an estate valued at \$1,585.68, according to records filed in Civil District Court.

Ferrie was found dead Feb. 22, 1967, in his second floor apartment at 1330 Louisiana Avenue Pkwy. Orleans Parish Coroner Nicholas Chetta said the cause of death was bursting of a blood vessel in the brain, and ruled out suicide or sinister factors.

His assets included \$418.50 worth of household effects and \$1,167.18 in other movable property.

Among his possessions were a matching ring set with small diamonds valued at \$50, a sewing machine, an aqua-lung air tank, two microscopes and a hypothecary scale with weights.

Ferrie's estate also included a \$9.97 savings account, \$157.21 checking account, and a \$1,000 insurance policy.

His July 23, 1966, handwritten will left everything to Alvin R. Beaubouef, and said he especially wanted him to have a diamond ring Ferrie had hidden in the dining room table.

An unsigned note found on the dining room table read in part, "To leave this life is, for me, a sweet prospect. I find nothing in it that is desirable and on the other hand, everything that is loathsome."
