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LOIS W_STON, Aircraft Registration Branch, Federal Aviation Agency (FAA), Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, reviewed her files under registration number 8293K and advised this registration number is issued to a Stinson 150 aircraft with serial number 108-1293... This aircraft was registered to <u>DAVE W. FERRIE</u>, 1302 Clay Street, Kenney, Louisiana, on May 8, 1947. The latest registration records in file list FERRIE as the registered owner. His last address recorded in the file is 704 Airline Park Boulevard, Kenner, Louisiana,

WESTON advised that an application for airworthiness certificate dated April 7, 1961, is contained in the file and this certificate, according to regulations, would be valid as long as the aircraft is operated in accordance with operating regulations. There was no particular expiration date listed on this certificate and there is no information available in FAA files which would indicate that this circraft is no longer airworthy. WESTON added, however, that in the event FERRIE had not complied with FAA regulations his aircraft would not be airworthy but it is not ... necessary that this information be recorded in the FAA files.

ROBERT L. OSWALD, 4720 Alamo, Wichita Falls, Texas, on 2/23/67 contacted SA JARRELL H. DAVIS and SA JAMES J. SHERMAN and advised that during February, 1954 while he was on furlough, he visited his brother, LEE HARVEY OSWALD and his mother for a short time in New Orleans, Louisiana. He added that at this time LEE HARVEY OSWALD was active in the Civil Air Patrol at New Orleans, Louisiana.

Mr. OSWALD mentioned that sometime during the past three years, he had heard from some source (exact source not recalled) that <u>DAVID</u> FERRIE had at one time been active in the Civil Air Patrol in New Orleans, Louisiana and some other city, the name of which he does not recall. He added that he did not recall or did not know when FERRIE was supposed to have been active in the Civil Air Patrol in New Orleans.

Mr. OSWALD advised that he had never met and did not know DAVID FERRIE but in view of the fact that there has been considerable publicity during the past week concerning an investigation the District Attorney in New Orleans, Louisiana is conducting in which FERRIE's name has been mentioned, that he got to thinking that it might have been possible that FERRIE could possibly have been active in the Civil Air Patrol in New Orleans at the same time his brother, LEE, was active. He added he had no information to this effect but it was merely a thought of his possibility. He added that even though it might not be correct, he thought it his duty to report it to the FBI this possibility that he had thought about.

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
