Dear Mr. Lesar:

This is in response to the Freedom of Information Act request of your client, Mark Allen, for records about the House Select Committee on Assassinations.

In our letter dated May 29, 1984, we advised you that we had submitted one document (item 8) for declassification review. That review is now complete and the document has been partially declassified. We are releasing this document to you in part. Portions of item 8 are being withheld pursuant to 5 U.S.C. 552(b)(1) which permits the withholding of information properly classified pursuant to Executive Order. In addition, portions of this item are being withheld pursuant to 5 U.S.C. 552(b):

- (6) which permits the withholding of personnel and medical and similar files the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy; and,
- (7) which permits the withholding of investigatory records compiled for law enforcement purposes, but only to the extent that the production of such records would:
 - (C) constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy.

Pursuant to Department regulations, you have a right to appeal the deletions as a partial denial of your request. This appeal must be made within thirty days in writing and addressed directly to: Office of Information and Privacy, United States Department of Justice, 10th Street and Constitution Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20530. The envelope and letter should be clearly marked, "FOIPA Appeal". If on appeal your request is denied, judicial review will thereafter be available to you in the district in which you reside or have your principal place of business or the district in which the records denied to you are located or the District of Columbia.

It is noted that recent information furnished to the Department concerning the subject indicates that he is identified as head of the International Anticommunist Brigade and was present with several of his men at a gathering of some 75 Cubans at Davie Airport, Davie, Florida, on July 2, 1961, at which occasion, Gerald Patrick Herming, head of the Intercontinental Penetration Forces, and séveral individuals made parachute jumps. The "Miami Herald" on July 3, 1961, reportedly contained an article indicating that approximately 70 men of Sturgis' organization were scheduled to make parachute jumps but only two parachutes were available. In this article Sturgis (Fiorini) claimed his organization has 5,000 men of which 700 are in training and that his organization includes paratroop groups, underwater demolition teams, and others in educational activities.
