Mr. BLAKEY. This is a photograph taken by Mr. Joseph Louw, an African student who was staying at the Lorraine.

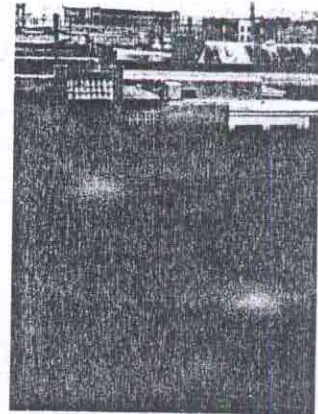
As can be seen from Mr. Louw's photo, the line of fire from the bathroom window to room 306 of the Lorraine is not obstructed.

It can also be seen in this photograph that this was taken moments after the assassination, for Dr. King's body can be seen on the lower right-hand corner of the photograph.

It is a photograph taken on April 5, 1968, by the Memphis Police Department from the second floor bathroom window, looking toward the Lorraine Motel.
